We have witnessed the closing of the final chapter of Rotary's first 100 years of glorious existence. Today, we will start writing the first chapter of its second 100 years of selfless service.

In our Rotary calendar, July is Literacy month. The first thrust of our R.I. President, Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar, is Literacy. While this emphasis is one that exemplifies his commitment to continuity, one that he wants to sustain from the time that it was a major thrust of Past R.I. President Jonathan Majiyagbe, and carried on by last year's R.I. President Glenn Estess, he firmly believes that "literacy and education is the most basic need for a person to live an acceptable, decent life."

According to a UNESCO survey conducted in the year 2000, 860 million adults worldwide are illiterate and more than 100 million children do not have access to schooling. Today, five years after that survey was done, we still do not know if



### RI President's Message

Dear fellow Rotarians:

In 2005-06, we will embark on our second century of Rotary service with a sturdy base on which to build, a past record of success to serve as our compass, and a rich history from which to draw inspiration. And while we must never remain locked in the past, its lessons can surely fuel our steady movement forward.

With this in mind, I looked to the many wise words that Rotarians have written over the past century to select a theme that best expresses our vital mission, Of all the inspirational messages that have guided our thinking and motivated us to action, I found none that defined Rotary and the Rotarian spirit better than the three simple words of our motto, **Service Above Self**.



THEME 2005 - 2006

It is my privilege to serve as president of Rotary International during the year we will begin to write the first chapter of Rotary's second hundred years. Taking **Service Above Self** as the theme for this important year reflects my desire to use the best and most meaningful words to inspire Rotarians. But I also suggest this theme in an effort to keep our Rotary lives simple — an approach that requires maintaining continuity from previous years and setting a straightforward path for the future. I prefer, therefore, to focus on those



areas in which we have demonstrated significant strength in the past and that represent the most basic human needs.

One such area is literacy and education. From one-on-one tutoring efforts to large-scale literacy programs, Rotary clubs have developed an impressive array of projects designed to help people learn to read and write. We have equipped schools, educated teachers, and given children the clothing and books required to attend classes. And in communities throughout the world, Rotarians are taking the time to visit schools, reading to children and listening to them read in turn,


Despite our many successes, countless adults cannot read or write a simple sentence or are functionally illiterate — that is, they are unable to use reading, writing, and calculation to engage in most work and normal daily activities. Clearly, Rotary's considerable experience and continued commitment is needed in addressing this problem, which limits so many people in their efforts to care for themselves and their families.

In 2005-06,1 also encourage Rotarians to continue their work on water management, another issue that Rotarians have effectively addressed in many parts of the world. Thanks to scores of Rotary club water projects, hundreds of thousands of people now have convenient access to water and enjoy the many health benefits associated with clean water and adequate sanitation.

But so much remains to be done. Far too many people have no access to a safe water supply and lack adequate sanitation, resulting in needless deaths from preventable waterrelated diseases. Water management issues also affect the food supply, as it

takes 2,000 to 5,000 liters of water to produce the daily food intake of one person. The United Nations calls the global water crisis "a threat to economic development, to poverty reduction, to the environment and to peace and security." The continued action of Rotarians is desperately needed to alleviate hunger and improve the health and well-being of all those who are deprived of this essential resource.

While I believe that literacy and water management are two concerns that urgently need our attention, I know that Rotary clubs are also addressing many other equally critical issues. The beauty of Rotary is that it offers so many options for service. Clubs see a need in



their community and then determine how to use their human and material resources to best meet it.

That grassroots participation is a hallmark of Rotary's success, and I encourage



all clubs to continue providing the service that is most beneficial to communities at home and abroad, We cannot do it

We cannot do it alone, however. Very often, we can accomplish more for our communities by working together

with other organizations that share our ideals and goals. As you are planning your service agenda for the year, consider how your club's efforts might be multiplied by partnering with another organization.

Rotarians enthusiastically adopted the motto Service Above Self in 1911 because it so aptly articulated the ideals that the fledgling organization was in the process of developing. For 95 years, this motto has served as the underlying motif of our efforts to carry out humanitarian service, promote high ethical international standards. and work for understanding and peace. As with anything that has become an innate part of our lives, it is easy to take this motto for granted. The corning year will offer all Rotarians an opportunity to reflect carefully on the true meaning of Service Above Self, as we renew our commitment to this timeless message of compassion and generosity of spirit.





## DISTRICT 3850 District plans and programs for RY 2005 - 2006:

For this coming Rotary Year, our district has very simple plans and programs, which we think is in harmony with the plans and programs of Rotary International President, Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar. Because we are spearheading and sort of "blazing the path" that Rotary will take in its journey towards the next century of service to humanity, we feel that the organization's very foundation and pillars that have sustained it for the last 100 years, must be reinforced, to make sure that the next 100 years, will be as fruitful, (if not more), as it was in the past.

In a nutshell, our main concentration will be on: 1<sup>st</sup>, strengthening each club in the district, by expanding its membership base with new, dynamic Rotarians, and at the same time, placing a premium on the retention of its 2<sup>nd</sup>, conducting service existing members; projects for our communities, with emphasis on Rotary International's thrusts. namely. Literacy, Water, Health and Hunger Concerns, and  $3^{rd}$ . using all the resources available; supporting the Rotary Foundation through more contributions by making all Rotarians of the Foundation Rotary district. Sustaining Members (RFSM).

Because this is the first year of Rotary's second 100 years, concentration on Rotary basics is a primary consideration. The contributing factors that give strength and endurance to the backbone of this great organization, are its basic principles and objectives.

Therefore, our main focus will be on:

1. Membership Development. Our membership goal for the district, is a minimum net growth of 110 new Rotarians. We will do this by bringing the membership level of all clubs in the district, to at least 20 members. Presently, we have 14 clubs with less than 20 members. If all of these clubs achieve their goals, we will have 70 new Rotarians. With the goal of a net growth of one new Rotarian for the rest of the 40 clubs in the district, our district goal of a minimum net growth of 110 new members, will already be met. Of course, we expect to go way over this figure, because we have already started to lay the groundwork, to charter 5 new clubs in Mindanao alone. Before our year of service is over, we hope to have Rotary clubs in Lamitan, Basilan Province, Kabasalan and Buug, Province of Sibugay, and in Liloy and Sindangan, Province of Zamboanga del Norte.

- 2. Service to the Community. The is community where Rotary International's thrusts on Literacy, Water, Health and Hunger concerns, will be implemented. In line with the thrust to have access to clean and safe water, we intend to organize more Rotary Community Corps (RCCs). This will ensure the involvement and lasting relationships between Rotary and the communities where these projects will be implemented. We intend to do these projects through matching grants and through a program of community selfhelp.
- 3. The Rotary Foundation. Last year's contribution to the Rotary Foundation, was the best ever, by our district. District Governor Nanette and her District Team, did so well, that they

increased the average per capita contribution to the TRF over the last 5 years, by more than 300 per cent. Just equaling that achievement, will already be a formidable task. But we will try our very best to keep abreast and perhaps, to even hope for a modest increase of 5 per cent.

- 4. Leadership development. On this aspect, we have already had the Presidents-elect and Secretaries-elect Training Seminar, four separate District Assemblies (DISTAS) and the Assistant Governors and District Team Training Seminar. Within the next few months, we will be conducting Stewardship Seminars for the Rotary Foundation. And on August 3 - 4, 2005, we will TRF Membership have а and Development Tri-District Conference in Cebu City. This will be hosted by Districts 3850, 3860 and 3870. Then on October 22 - 23, 2005, we will have a good opportunity to bring prospective, future Rotary leaders, to the Zone Institute in Manila, where they will be able to experience a mini international assembly, with Rotary leaders from our neighboring countries in attendance. All these seminars and conferences offer wonderful opportunities for growth for our future leaders.
- 5. As to the  $3^{rd}$ thrust of Rotary International, we will embark on the promotion of Rotary's Public Image, with more intensity than ever. This is guaranteed, because our district is very fortunate to have the Public Image Zone Coordinator for Southeast Asia. Enigardo "Jundad" B. Legislador, Jr., who was appointed to that position by R.I. President Carl-Wilhelm himself, as our Public Relations District Chair and Resource Group leader for Public Image. Past President Jundad is also

the Assistant Governor for his area in Kabankalan, Negros Occidental. It will be only natural therefore, that the first public image project for Southeast Asia, which is still under wraps, will be launched in District 3850.

- 6. Apart from all the plans mentioned above, every club in the district will be asked to start or to launch an environmental project that will be sustained, continued and passed on, from the incumbent club president, to his successor, and to all the succeeding presidents.
- 7. We will also initiate an intensified, district wide campaign, for more lifetime subscribers to the Philippine Rotary Magazine.

### Trustees change grants program

At their April 2005 meeting, The Rotary Foundation Trustees made some changes to the Matching Grants program and placed a moratorium on the award of Individual Grants.

The Trustees' decision raises the minimum Matching Grant award to US\$5,000, effective 1 July 2005. This change is aimed at focusing on sustainable projects that have a greater impact on communities. Applications submitted before 31 March2005 may. however, be funded under the previous rules if they are complete by 31 October 2005.

Beginning 1 July 2006, the host partner of a Matching Grant in the project country is required to make a minimum contribution of \$100. The Trustees made this decision based on evidence that projects that include a financial contribution from the local community have greater investment and oversight.

The Trustees also placed a moratorium on Individual Grants, as of 1 July 2005. However, all applications submitted in the 2004-05 program year maybe funded if they are complete by 31 October 2005.
