Message from the District Governor

Dear fellow Rotarians,

Our R.I. President, Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar, calls it the daughter of Rotary International. Indeed, the Rotary Foundation, born in 1917, is the vital link that makes it possible for Rotary International to make a difference in the lives of people around the world. In the fight against poverty, disease and ignorance, the Rotary Foundation is the beacon of hope that shines through the darkness of the millions of people in need.

We all know how the foundation works. We have seen how it took on the challenge to eradicate a deadly disease called Polio, which killed and destroyed millions of young lives. Soon, our world will be free of this malady. Aside from health issues, foundation or the TRF, as it popularly called by Rotarians, funds programs to fight illiteracy, hunger and many other global plaguing concerns humanity, through humanitarian and study

grants. The Group Study Exchange (GSE), Youth Exchange (ROTEX), Ambassadorial and Rotary World Peace Scholarships are just a few of the regular, yearly programs that TRF undertakes.

The Rotary Foundation story is quite an interesting one. From an initial contribution of \$26.50 to the Rotary Endowment Fund as it was originally called in 1917, the foundation grew very slowly. For all its efforts, after 6 years, it only had \$700.00 to show. It was only in 1947, 30 years after its birth, upon the death of Rotary's founder, Paul Harris, that the foundation grew rapidly. Today, TRF receives more than \$65,000,000.00 yearly.

Where do these funds come from and why do people willingly give to the Rotary Foundation? There is no doubt that TRF is one of the best managed foundations in the world. Its track record speaks for itself. While there may have been a few lapses in the area of stewardship by recipient Rotary Clubs, the foundation's management has been excellent. The managers and the trustees of TRF have seen to it that every cent is well spent. And for this reason, not only Rotarians, but many other generous people, entrust their contributions to help the less privileged, to the foundation.

President's Message

Carl-Wilhelm Stenhammar 2005-06 Rotary International President

Dear fellow Rotarians,

Cooperation is, in my opinion, one of the key words for the future of Rotary. All the issues that we deal with are

huge: polio, literacy, water, health, and hunger, just to name a few. Issues that we cannot solve by ourselves, but can reach further in cooperation with others.

However, we do not have to go outside our own building in order to cooperate. Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation must join forces to reach good results.

Quite recently, I was interviewed by the Chicago Tribune because of Rotary's 100th anniversary. At one point the interviewer asked me to name a few years that could highlight our first century. I answered 1905, 1917, 1947, mid-'70s, 1985, and 2005. Then I expanded on why I had picked just those occasions.

Afterward, I made a personal observation. I was answering a question regarding highlighting Rotary International, and all the years I mentioned, apart from 1905 and 2005, reflected on The Rotary Foundation. The year 1917 was the start of our Rotary Foundation, when then-RI President Arch Klumph announced that we should accept endowments for doing good in the world - and The Rotary Foundation was born. The year 1947 was when contributions started to come in commemoration of the death of founder Paul Harris. The mid-'70s was when humanitarian programs were added to the Foundation's hitherto educational programs only, and the 3-H grants program was launched to improve social development among people in the world. The year 1985 was, of course, when we started our polio eradication program.

Rotary International is the mother of The Rotary Foundation. One would think that a mother 100 years old could live independently from her daughter 88 years old. But this is not possible. In raising funds for the daughter, the mother is of vital importance and the mother has no way of spending the funds raised – that's for the daughter to do.

This shows how important cooperation is between Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation.

May it so remain when, through Service Above Self, we celebrate November as Rotary Foundation Month.

For many years, our district has been one of the smallest contributors to the Rotary Foundation. Yet, we have benefited much from it, through humanitarian matching grants, youth and group study exchanges and many more. It was only last year that our contributions broke the \$50,000.00 mark. Thanks to our Immediate Past District Governor, Nanette T. Garcia, for making us realize that our district is capable of giving more to the foundation and that its Rotarians are just as generous as any other.

This year, Rotary International's target is still a minimum of a hundred dollars (P5,600.00) per capita contribution to the Rotary Foundation from every Rotarian. Before, I was of the impression that this is an impossible target. But now, after having met almost all of you in the course of my club visits, I know that with a little extra effort, we can all do it. I am sure that we are all capable of giving daily contributions of 15 pesos and 34

DISTRICT SECRETARY'S CORNER

It is not easy being the Club Secretary. It entails a lot of sacrifices especially in terms of time, resources and especially patience. In the club, the Club Secretary is expected to know everything about what is happening in the club, even about Rotary considering that she/he is the keeper of the club's correspondences and documents from the District and Rotary International. It is important therefore, that the Club President and Secretary work well together.

I became a Club Secretary in Rotary year 1999-2000 only two years after I joined Rotary in 1997. Surprisingly, I did not have difficulty in assuming the responsibility basically because the previous Club Secretary has briefed me well. It is a practise in our club that the outgoing Secretary brief the incoming Secretary on the reports to submit, where to submit it, deadlines, bank accounts to deposit the annual dues, TRF contributions, and other responsibilities expected of the Club Secretary. To top it, the incoming Secretary inherits a bagful of documents and reference materials which the he/she can study or review. It made it easier for me to assume the position. Why am I saying this?

Next month or even late this month, the clubs will be electing their club officers for Rotary Year 2006-2007. As in the practice of some clubs, the Club President is usually given the option or discretion to choose the Club Secretary, which is to my personal opinion a better arrangement. Most often than not though, clubs elect the newer member to the post knowing that it is the position that requires a lot of responsibilities. Most "older" members would usually beg off saying that they have had their time already. If you ask me however, "older" members who have not yet served as Club Secretary should take up the challenge to assume the post especially if you are the choice of your President-Elect. The years of experience in Rotary of the "older" member spell a difference. So if you are elected or selected for the position, are you up to the challenge? If you choose to elect a newer member though to be your Club Secretary, would any of the past secretaries be willing to guide him or her? Think about it... the Club Secretary is the heart of the club.

In last month's issue of the GML, I have shared with you some of Rotary International's administrative policies on attendance. I hope the clubs took note of it. I will share more of these policies in my column in the succeeding issues of the GML. For those of you who want to do your own advance reading on the policies, check out RI's Manual of Procedure at http://

www.rotary.org/newsroom/downloadcenter/support/mop.html. The Rotary website (www.rotary.org) is so rich with any information about Rotary. You can also download all the forms you need such as the matching grant forms, Interact or Rotaract registration form to name a few.

Nuestra Señora del Pilar de Zaragosa Shrine and Fort

Build in 1635 by Jesuit Architects and engineers with 1,000 visayan workers, caviteños together with 300 Spanish soldiers. To fortify and protect the Spanish enclave here in Zamboanga. The small community around the construction site actually was the start of the "town" of Zamboanga. The fort through several renovations restorations since the time it was originally built. It stands as a piece of architecture designed for warfare and a clear evidence of the Spanish occupation and influence in the City. Today, it stands as the epitome of the culture of what is a Christianized city with the shrine of the Lady of the pillar that was enshrined in 1784 ast the eastern gate and from then on, became the Patron Saint and Protector of the City. The Fort is also the repository of the material culture of the different tribes and indigenous peoples of the

city, in which are exhibited for public viewing and managed by the National Museum. It also features exhibits for local artists.



The cross at the historic Fort Pilar which was built by the Spaniards in 1635, where devotees say their prayer before lighting their candles.

The Spaniards stayed on for three centuries.



Every year, thousands of devotees flock to Fort Pilar to light their candles for the Lady of the Pillar. The fort became a shrine as stories of miraculous events of the La Virgen del Pilar began to be told.
