TRAINING FOR RRIMC

Villanueva (Bacolod South, D-3850, Philippines) has been requested by RI Pres.- Elect William "Bill" Boyd to assume the very important role of Regional Rotary International Membership Coordinator (RRIMC) for Zone 7B (Philippines) effective 1 July 2006. In view of his acceptance of this challenging assignment, he will attend a meeting called by PE Bill for the 2006-07 Regional RI Membership Coordinators that will start on 12 March, Sunday, and end on 15 March, Wednesday, at the North Shore Skokie Hotel & Executive Meeting Center, Skokie, Illinois, USA.

During the meeting, PDG DAVE and his fellows RRIMCs will undergo training on their specific duties and responsibilities in line with our organization's primary focus on membership and the thrusts to be announced by PE Bill during the 2006 International Assembly to be held on 16-23 February in San Diego, California, USA.

The RRIMC program was established by the RI Board of Directors in August 2000 to focus on the increased emphasis and communication on membership at both District and Club levels. The RRIMC will work closely with our District Governors in order to continue the work towards membership retention, growth and development; building stronger Clubs; and keeping Rotarians informed, connected and involved.

Upon his return from the RRIMC meeting, PDG Dave is expected to meet with and train PDG Roberto "Bobby" Viray (Cubao East, D-3780), the RY 2006-07 RI Membership Zone Coordinator (RIMZC) for Zone 7B. He will also meet with the ten (10) Philippine District Governors-Elect to lay down strategies and programs to be adopted that will promote membership growth and coordinate membership development efforts in our country for RY 2006-07.

To the club president or secretary, the end of the first semester may be seen in either perspective:

In which category do you belong?

Most often, many club officers belong to the second category. It is a sad fact but this is the case for many. This is the reason why many get burned out in Rotary by the time their term has ended especially the club president or the secretary. They either leave Rotary or become inactive members on the following year of their term. Has anyone ever done a study on this? I know that many have recognized this as a problem but have not addressed this issue.

I, too, am guilty of feeling that way when I was entering my second semester of my presidency. However, along the way on my second semester, my interest and enthusiasm was regained by the activities we have lined up for the centennial celebration. By the time my term ended, I felt drained. I thought I have had enough of Rotary. But that was not the case - in fact the responsibility given me has even expanded to the district level. And I am as enthusiastic as I ever was when I first joined Rotary.

Why was I able to bounce back?

First, I always looked back to my objective on why I joined Rotary - which is to serve. Rotary serves as my vehicle to be of service to others.

It may sound corny or too basic but it is true. I found the right organization that will allow me to share my time, talent and resources.

Second, I took every hardships and travails I faced along the way as challenges and opportunities for growth as a person. I know I have grown as a better person after facing all the challenges that came my way during my presidency.

GET READY TO ENJOY IN ZAMBOANGA

Rotarians around District 3850 should start making plans to cut a rug in the exciting and fascinating City of Zamboanga, April 28-30, 2006 for the DISCON '06. The conference of the new millennium offers Rotarians and other invited guests the opportunity to gather in an atmosphere of complete joy and fellowship and set the national tone toward a dynamic course for the 21st century.

Zamboanga city, rich in culture and history is dubbed as the City of Flowers. The Castilian heritage is 70% Spanish and 30% mixed of other languages. The Spanish culture influences the way of life of the Zamboangeños. The culture blends harmoniously with Moorish and western influence.

The City is situated on the southern most tip of the Zamboanga Peninsula, 460 nautical miles of Manila and 365 nautical miles northeast of Kota Kinabalu, Malaysia. It is bounded to the west by Sulu Sea, to the east by the Moro Gulf and to the south by Basilan Straits and Celebes Sea. It has a total land area of 142,099.99 hectares with more than a half million inhabitants.

It is an hour and a half by jet from Manila and one hour from Cebu. It is one of the principal ports of call for cruise ships and inter island vessels on the Manila-Cebu-Davao-Cotabato-Jolo-Tawi-Tawi-General Santos-Cebu routes.

Tourist attractions and destinations include Pasonanca Park, Fort Pilar (marine Museum, Geological exhibits, Galleon Artifacts); Plaza Pershing; Climaco Freedom Park (Christian Pool, Tomb of the unknown Soldier, Holy Hill, Ninoy Aquino Memorial Shrine); Yakan Weaving Village; Zamboanga Economic Zone, San Ramon Complex; Fishing factories in the west coast; Mount Pulumbato and the Lantawan Mountain Resort; Taluksangay Muslim Village; Sangali Fishing Port; Inland Resorts and Western Mindanao Power Corporation Complex.

One can shop at the famous BBC and Canelar Barter Trade Centers; Mindpro Citimall; Yubengco Star Mall; Shop-o-Rama; Shopper's Central; Chain of Plaza Malls; Golden Bells; Ukay-Ukay, Sta Cruz Market and San Luis Shell crafts.

The spark of excitement kindled at last years District Conference in Bacolod. The Host Organizing Committee has been eagerly preparing for and anticipating the arrival of Rotarians and guests from all over the island of Negros, Panay, Antique, Capiz, Iloilo, Zamboanga Peninsula, Basilan & Tawi Tawi.

Zamboanga City lies at the heart of Mindanao region about which relatively lime is known or unknown for its peace and tranquility; generosity and hospitality of its people. Always a victim of arrogant and careless news-papering sending media messages with falsities and misconception of danger, Zamboanga City, will not soon be forgotten by those who will attend the Conference. The natural beauty of its surrounding and the peaceful and hospitable people who want to make your stay most enjoyable will no doubt entice you to return someday in this City, often called one of the most livable and lovable places in the country.

And of course, the eye of the District Conference whirlwind are the newly constructed 4 star Convention Center - The Regency at Pasonanca and Garden Orchid Convention Center will offer all the expected highlights, informative plenary sessions and stimulating fellowships.

The Host Organizing Committee sincerely hopes that you will have as much fun attending this conference as we are preparing for it, for you! We are delighted to hear you are coming and are confident that you will fall in love with Zamboanga.
