Proper use of the Rotary Emblem

All Rotary clubs throughout the District print or display a number of materials showing our Rotary emblem. In order to protect the integrity of our gearwheel emblem, Rotary International came out with a Visual Style Manual which can be downloaded from the rotary website (http://www.rotary.org/newsroom/ downloadcenter/pdfs/547en99.pdf). On the guidelines for the use of the Rotary Name and Emblem in our projects and programs, kindly refer to the following link: (http://www.rotary.org/newsroom/ downloadcenter/pdfs/rotary_marks_projects.pdf).

With graphics materials easily available for download via the Rotary website, problems involving misuse of the Rotary gearwheel is not as rampant as before. But as a quick review for, below is a list of things for us to consider the next time we use our Rotary emblem:

Rotary Gearwheel

- a. The official emblem of RI is a gearwheel of 6 spokes or arms, 24 teeth or cogs;
- b. A keyway was added to signify the usefulness of the gearwheel;
- c. One tooth is placed on the center line of each spoke or arm and three in between the center lines of the arms.
- d. The Rotary Emblem may be reproduced in any one color.
- e. If it is reproduced in more than one color, it should be reproduced in its official colors of royal blue and gold.
- f. Gold may be represented as a metallic color or as a yellow.

Below are a few examples of the improper use of the **Rotary gearwheel:**


Never delete the words "Rotary International" or any other portion of the gearwheel.



1. The gearwheel is incomplete without the keyway (left). Early in its history, engineers argued that without the keyway, the wheel would just be an idler. The emblem is also incomplete without the circle around the keyway (middle) while the center of the keyway should not be filled in as it should be blank or without color (right).



2. Never distort the emblem so that it can fit your masterpiece layout (left and middle). Using the negative image of the emblem when printing one color documents is also not allowed. (right).



3. Using the emblem as part of some other frivolous design - as in the case of the bicycle wheel - is to be discouraged. Rotarians should always honor the official design of the gearwheel, never embellishing it or re-creating it in a version of their own. The approved design is available from RI as a printer's proof, on computer disk, and on the RI Web site.



4. Never use the wheel as part of a background for some other text. The wheel should always be used in its entirety, un-obscured by type (or text) or any other design element.

Lee has also served as honorary consul to the Italian consulate in Korea since 1994 and

was awarded the Order of Industrial Merit by the Korean government. He and his wife, Young Ja, have two sons and two daughters.

A Rotarian since 1971, Lee has served RI as a director, treasurer, district governor, training leader, regional Rotary Foundation coordinator, and membership task force coordinator in Asia. He began his tenure on the Foundation's Board of Trustees in 2003-04 and is a recipient of the Foundation's Citation for Meritorious Service.





TRF Contributions

It was a good night for The Rotary Foudation (TRF) during the Joint Governor's Address of Rotary Clubs in Negros Occidental held at the Business Inn in Bacolod City. Governor Toto recognized and pinned nine new Paul Harris Fellows and a total of 35 generous Rotarians have either paid or pledged to give at least \$100 to TRF.

So far, our District has 22 new Paul Harris Fellows and 94 Rotary Foundation Sustaining Members (RFSM). Although most of the RFSM contributors are pledges, PHF contibutions are mostly paid already. I appeal to those Rotarians who have pledged to please remit your contributions already. I will email the club presidents to remind them of the names of Rotarians who have made firm pledges.

Overdue Grant Reporting

The Trustees have reaffirmed that an essential component of stewardship of grant funds is the preparation and submission of timely and accurate grant reports. Consequently they have established the goal that all districts and their member Rotary clubs are consistently 100 percent current and compliant with reporting requirements. In order to facilitate reaching this goal, the following steps will be taken: • TRF has established a system of reminders for sponsors of grants to submit grant reports.

• Clubs or districts that have sponsored grants and have not reported on the use of grant funds for 21 months or more will be posted on the RI website.

• If 30 months or more have passed since clubs or districts reported on the use of grant funds, TRF will recommend to the RI Board of Directors termination of the appropriate sponsoring Rotary clubs.

TRF will be reviewing the status of reporting of districts and their member clubs on a semi-annual basis.

Districts and their member clubs that are less than 70 percent current and compliant with reporting requirements on two consecutive semi-annual reporting statistics analyses will be suspended from participation in the Humanitarian Grants program.

Therefore, may I remind the clubs with overdue reports for matching grants to please submit their final reports. Please remember that outstanding final reports halt the acceptance, approval and payment of future grants sponsored by our clubs and district.

S eventy-four Negrense children with cleft lip and palate defects were successfully operated on during the 10-day Rotaplast Medical Mission which ended last 30 September 2006 at the Bago District Hospital in Bago City, Negros Occidental.

The mission was held in cooperation with the Bago City local government headed by Mayor Janet Torres and the Rotary Club of Bacolod-South, which hosted the 23-medical personnel team from San Francisco, California, USA, who left San Francisco last 21 September and returned last 1 October.

Bacolod South Pres. Fermin Divinagracia expressed great joy over the turn-out of patients and outpouring of support from the project's benefactors, after seeing the smiles return in the faces of the children-beneficiaries, many of whom have suffered ridicule and inferiority for having been born with cleft lips and/or cleft palates.

The Rotaplast team was headed by Rtn. Evelyn Abad (RC San Francisco, California, USA) as the Mission Director, with Dr. Granger Wong as the Medical Director. They were joined by four surgeons, three anesthesiologists among other medical and non-medical volunteers including Cebu-based Dr. Joecel Reyes and Peace Corps volunteer Karen Silberg (presently based in Dumarao, Capiz), who came to Bacolod City to meet her surgeonfather, Rtn. Barry Silberg (RC Santa Rosa, California, USA) and stayed on for the duration of the mission.

Rotaplast International, Inc. selected Bago City as its third mission site in the Philippines, with the first mission in the Philippines conducted in Cebu City five years ago hosted by the Rotary Club of Cebu Port Center. The Bago Rotaplast Medical Mission was conceptualized by PDG Anton Florendo (RC Cebu Port Center, D-3860) and PDG Dave Villanueva (RC Bacolod South, D-3850), who served as District Governors in RY 1998-99, three years ago, with Rtn. Evelyn Abad deciding on Bago City Hospital as the mission site after visiting and surveying the various hospital sites in Bacolod City and its neighboring cities during the past 2 years. The Bago mission was funded with the support of the two Rotary Clubs in San Luis Obispo, California, USA.

The Rotary Club of Bacolod South credits the support of Negrenses who contributed to the success of the mission, including the Negros Occidental provincial government through Gov. Joseph Marañon; Riverside Medical Center for allowing the use of their anesthesia machines; Philippine Airlines for facilitating freeof-charge transport of the medical equipment and supplies; Sugarland Hotel for accommodating the medical team; McDonalds and Nissin Monde.

The Bacolod South Rotaplast Working Committee was headed by Pres. Fermin Divinagracia, PDG Dave Villanueva, DGE Prince Gerochi and PP Percy Comia. With the success of its Bago Mission, Rotaplast International has agreed to return to Bago City next year on 11-21 October 2007, timing its mission during the celebration of the famed Masskara Festival.

The Rotary Club of Bacolod and SY BOON PIT Foundation in their desire to help address the continuing micronutrient malnutrition problem among school children has established the Nutri-Bread Project at Rafael Alunan Elementary School District III, Division of Bacolod City in collaboration with the Nutrition Center of the Philippines and IMPACT Foundation Philippines.

The project aims to make available in school, inexpensive and widely consumed fortified pandesal (traditional bread) or any other bread baked using vitamin A and iron fortified wheat flour to school children and community. A 25gm. or one serving of Nutri-Bread that cost Php 1.00 contains considerable amount of calorie, protein, vitamin B, iron and vitamin A. The Nutri-Bread intends to eventually replace the "junk foods" that are popularly eaten by school children. Frequent consumption of Nutri-Bread can control and prevent vitamin A deficiency and anemia as well as lessen the number of underweight school children.

The Rotary Nutri-Bread project was launched on February 17,2006. Some of the honored guests were Executive Officers and members of the Rotary Club of Bacolod, Executive Officers of the Sy Boon Pit Foundation, Bacolod City Division Schools Superintendent, District Schools Supervisors, School Principals, Teachers, PTCA Officers, Barangay Officials and pupils.

Part of the Launching program is the turning- over of the Key of Responsibility from Rotary Club of Bacolod to Rafael Alunan Elementary School. This was followed by the signing of the Memorandum of Agreement that formalized the partnership between the funding institutions (The Rotary Club of Bacolod and The SY BOON PIT Foundation), the School implementor (RAES, Dep-Ed Bacolod City Division). The Nutrition Center of the Philippines and IMPACT Foundation Philippines are the institutions that provided technical support to project implementation.

The Nutri-Bread Project is a food and nutrition service for the school that builds awareness on the importance of fortified foods and micronutrient supplementation to school children and the community.

The donor agencies provided the school with a start-up baking ingredients for 15 days production of Nutri-Bread. The Nutri-Bread will be sold to school children and distributed to nearby schools and communities. The sales from Nutri-Bread will be used for the operating and maintenance expenses of the Nutri-Bread bakery to ensure sustainability of operations.

The Rotary Club of Bacolod will provide the school with an incentive of Php100.00 for every 500 pcs. of Nutri-Bread baked and sold. The bakery is producing 1,625 pcs. of assorted breads daily from 1 bag of fortified flour, making various types of fortified baked bread at 25 gms per piece. The Nutri-Bread is sold at a very affordable price of Php 1.00 per piece to school children and community.

The occasion was inspired by the messages coming from Dr. Milagros Gonzales, Div. Schools Superintendent, Mrs. Antonette Ang, Schools District Supervisor, Mrs. Eden Ariola, School Principal and Rotary Club of Bacolod Past Presidents Edgar T. Sy and Rodolfo A. Parreño. The program ended with the distribution of Nutri-Bread to school children. The Nutri-Bread Project is a food and nutrition service for the school that builds awareness on the importance of fortified foods and micronutrient supplementation to school children and the community.

ABOUT **UDCATIONAL SERVICE** When professionals join a Rotary club, they do so as a representative of their particular

When professionals join a Rotary club, they do so as a representative of their particular business or profession. This gives Rotarians the dual responsibility of representing their vocation within the club and of exemplifying the ideals of Rotary within the workplace.

VOCATIONAL SERVICE FOCUSES ON:

Adherence to, and promotion of, the highest ethical standards in all occupations, including fair treatment of employers, employees, associates, competitors, and the public.

- The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, not just your own or those that are pursued by Rotarians.
- The contribution of your vocational talents to the problems and needs of society.
- The values expressed in The 4-Way Test and the Declaration for Rotarians in Business and Professions, which promote high ethical standards in the workplace, a central theme of Rotary throughout its history

Rotary's emphasis on vocational service has its roots in the founding of the organization in 1905. And the use of the classification principle — the guideline by which nearly all Rotary membership is determined — assures that each club has among its members a cross-section of a community's business and professional population.

The second part of the Object of Rotary calls for Rotarians to apply high ethical standards in their businesses and professions, recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations, and to consider their own occupations as opportunities to serve society.

In 1943, Rotarians were provided with a tool to help them achieve their vocational service goals when the RI Board of Directors voted to make The 4-Way Test an official component of the vocational service ideal. The test gave Rotarians a way to assess whether their personal and business dealings were being conducted with truth, fairness, goodwill, and decency.

For the first 80-plus years of Rotary's history, the second Avenue of Service — vocational service — was an area that focused on personal contributions that Rotarians could make within their own workplaces. Increasingly, however, clubs began to expand the definition of vocational service by organizing events such as career seminars and vocational training workshops.

So, in 1987, the RI Vocational Service Committee was called together — for the first time in 40 years — to redefine the second Avenue of Service. The committee created, and the RI Board adopted, new committee structures and determined that vocational service was now the responsibility of individual Rotarians and clubs within the workplace and the community.

In 1989, the Council on Legislation adopted the Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions. This declaration spelled out the high ethical standards referred to in the Object of Rotary, and it gave Rotarians another tool for gauging their own professional ethics as well as the ethical standards they hoped to encourage through vocational service projects.

Vocational service evolved further in the 1990s with two new opportunities for Rotarians to share their professional skills. In 1992, the Rotary Volunteers program was brought under the umbrella of vocational service. And in 1993, the International Vocational Contact Groups program was merged with World Fellowship Activities to form a new program called Rotary Fellowships.

DECLARATION OF ROTARIANS IN BUSINESSES AND PROFESSIONS

The Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions was adopted by the Rotary International Council on Legislation in 1989 to provide more specific guidelines for the high ethical standards called for in the Object of Rotary:

AS A ROTARIAN ENGAGED IN A BUSINESS OR PROFESSION, I AM EXPECTED TO:

- Consider my vocation to be another opportunity to serve;
- Be faithful to the letter and to the spirit of the ethical codes of my vocation, to the laws of my country, and to the moral standards of my community;
- Do all in my power to dignify my vocation and to promote the highest ethical standards in my chosen vocation;
- Be fair to my employer, employees, associates, competitors, customers, the public, and all those with whom I have a business or professional relationship;
- Recognize the honor and respect due to all occupations which are useful to society;
- Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief
 of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community;
- Adhere to honesty in my advertising and in all representations to the public concerning my business or profession;
- Neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally
 accorded others in a business or professional relationship
