Dear fellow Rotarians,

It's almost impossible to imagine Rotary today without The Rotary Foundation. So much of what Rotary is known for — international service projects, grants, scholarships and, above all, PolioPlus — depends on the Foundation. Without the Foundation, Rotary could never have grown into a truly international organization. A Rotary without Matching Grants, without Ambassadorial Scholars, and without the unifying fight for polio eradication would be a Rotary without many of the most important ties linking our clubs and districts.

The Rotary Foundation was not founded by coincidence. Because Rotary is an organization of businesspeople and professionals, we tend to be a very practical group. There are very few starry-eyed idealists in Rotary, and although we may follow our hearts, we lead with our heads. As Rotarians, we assess needs, consider our resources, and constantly try to do the most with what we have. Arch C. Klumph, the Foundation's founder, realized that a central pool of resources could increase the power of each Rotary club.

The Rotary Foundation is a major reason Rotarians are able to accomplish so much. But the Foundation's financial support is only part of the equation. The talents and reach of our membership mean that a dollar or a euro or a yen given to the Foundation can do much more than anyone might expect. When projects are run by knowledgeable volunteers, using volunteer labor and, often, donated materials, a relatively small grant can make a big difference.

Yet when hundreds or thousands of Rotarians come together to deliver vaccines during a National Immunization Day, the greatest hurdle has already been overcome, and the Foundation is there to help with the rest. Great works like these could not happen without Rotarians, and they could not happen without the Foundation.

Rotarians know the value of a good investment. That is why every year, Rotarians give to the Foundation. We know that our money will be used well and wisely by our fellow Rotarians and that together we can do so much more than we could ever do alone. That is why I ask all of you to Lead the Way in your clubs with a gift to the Foundation — this year and every year.

An untapped source of members: program alumni

Every year, Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation invest significant amounts of time and money in their programs. In 2004-05, Rotary clubs and districts provided leadership training for more than 20,000 young people through Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), supported about 410,000 service-minded youth in Interact and Rotaract clubs, and provided study-abroad opportunities for more than 10,000 students and young professionals through Rotary Youth Exchange, Ambassadorial Scholarships, and Group Study Exchange (GSE).

These programs not only attract the best and brightest young people but also produce individuals committed to leadership, service, and international understanding. Often, the people who participate in these programs become contributing members of their communities and share the values they learned in Rotary with the rest of the world.

Because of their dedication to Rotary's values, these program alumni could make great Rotarians. They are already more familiar with Rotary than the average prospective club member, and their participation in Rotary's programs indicates that they are interested in the organization's objectives. Why not capitalize on their experience with Rotary and get a return on the investment by keeping them involved in Rotary as club members?

The current status of alumni in Rotary

According to research conducted in 2005-06 by the Membership Development Division of Rotary International, only 2.9% of current Rotarians are program alumni. Additionally

- * 58% of clubs say they don't recruit program alumni for membership.
- * 22% of clubs claim to recruit alumni and actually have alumni as members.
- * 84% of current program participants are interested in joining a Rotary club.
- * 66% of program alumni are interested in joining a Rotary club.

So, why aren't more alumni joining Rotary clubs?

RI's research found that as more years pass after alumni leave a program, fewer and fewer of those alumni remain interested in joining a Rotary club. This decline in interest over time could stem from a significant decline in contact with Rotary, which was shown to occur once participants finished with their program. Alumni who had more frequent contact with Rotary after their program generally were more interested in joining a club than were alumni who had less frequent contact.

The top five reasons alumni identified for being interested in joining Rotary are:

1. Performing community service
2. Meeting a variety of people

3. Making a difference/Creating a better world
4. Helping others have the same experience
5. Being involved in a good organization

The top five reasons alumni identified for not being interested in joining Rotary are:

1. Too many other commitments/not enough time for Rotary
2. Cannot attend a weekly meeting
3. Membership is too expensive
4. Age difference between themselves and current members
5. Clubs are all or mostly men

Another issue is that many alumni simply aren't asked to join. Of those who are interested in joining and currently hold a professional, proprietary, executive, or managerial position

- * 58% of GSE alumni have not been pursued for membership.
- * 67% of Rotaract alumni have not been pursued for membership.
- * 82% of scholarship alumni have not been pursued for membership.

Strategies for clubs and districts

Considering the large number of new alumni each year, Rotary has tremendous growth potential, especially if these alumni were more effectively transitioned into Rotary clubs. Clubs and districts can implement many strategies to tap into alumni as a source of potential members:

- * Build strong relationships with current program participants. It's important to instill a "connection for life" with Rotary among program participants. The stronger connection participants have with Rotary while they're in their program, the better their experience will be and the more likely they will be to maintain contact with Rotary over time.
- * Develop an action plan for keeping alumni involved in Rotary activities and for transitioning them into Rotary clubs. This could include appointing an alumni subcommittee to manage tasks like tracking and maintaining contact with alumni.
- * Promote alumni so other Rotarians understand their importance. No matter how great alumni are, if other Rotarians don't see them as potential members, they won't treat them as potential members. Rotary clubs should recognize alumni as part of the family of Rotary, which could include featuring them in club and district newsletters, inviting them to speak at club events, or bringing compelling alumni stories to the local media.
- * Ask alumni to join and continue asking even if an initial invitation is declined.

Many alumni are waiting for clubs to contact them, but many

clubs are waiting for alumni to contact them. Because membership in Rotary is by invitation only, however, clubs must take the initiative. And if alumni decline an invitation, clubs should still keep in contact with them and find other ways they can be involved. As time passes, clubs should be persistent and keep asking. Alumni may change their mind as life circumstances change.

- * Help alumni find clubs that meet their needs. Sometimes alumni decline invitations to join because a club doesn't meet their specific needs. The alumni may need a club that meets at a different time or place. They may want to join a club that better matches their own demographics. Perhaps they want a club with a different meeting format or different projects. When alumni find a club that meets their needs, other reasons for not wanting to join, such as being too busy, quickly dissipate.
- * Use alumni to start new clubs. If alumni are having difficulty finding a club that meets their needs, clubs and districts could start new clubs. New all-alumni clubs have already been founded all over the world, including Germany, Italy, Japan, the Philippines, and the United States.
- * Maintain contact with younger alumni until they're qualified for membership. Not all alumni are qualified for membership as soon as they leave their programs. Don't lose touch with younger alumni just because they're not yet qualified for membership, however. The more contact alumni have with Rotary over time, the more they can sustain their enthusiasm and interest in joining a club.
- * Involve alumni in other programs. Clubs and districts can help maintain interest among alumni by getting them involved in other Rotary programs. For example, former Youth Exchange students can get involved in Interact and Rotaract clubs, former Interactors can participate in RYLA, and former Rotaractors can be part of GSE teams. By getting involved in other programs, alumni can better bridge the gap that occurs after they finish their initial program and before they become qualified for Rotary club membership.
- * Involve alumni in club and district activities. Many of the alumni who aren't yet ready to join a Rotary club still want to be involved in Rotary activities. Consider involving alumni in service projects, creating alumni events at the district conference, or including alumni on the selection or orientation committees for their program.
