## **ROTARY/INNERWHEEL VILLAGE SCHOOL**

The idea of putting up a school house at the Rotary/Innerwheel Village came out when PP Bert Pollisco and his wife Ann were informed that many children of school age in the village were not in school. They found out that the main reason for this is the far distance of the primary school from their homes.

Thus, a Grade I Extension Class was materialized and constructed inside the Rotary/Inner Wheel Village in Barangay

Dao, Pagadian City. The school, made of light materials, was inaugurated last June 10, 2008 in time for the school opening with 32 pupils. No less than the City Schools Superintendent Erlinda Salera and other DEP-ED officials in Pagadian City graced the occasion, together with the Rotarians and Innerwheel members.

Unfortunately, the little school house was recently destroyed by strong winds. We have to immediately construct a make-shift small building made of same light materials. In order to avoid that same unfortunate incident, the Rotary Club of Pagadian has decided to construct another building using concrete materials in the same area. Pledges were made by many kind-hearted Rotarians and preparations are underway for the construction of a concrete building to house not only Grade I but also Grade II classes.

### FROM THE RI PRESIDENT



Dear fellow Rotarians,

At the International Assembly in January, we were privileged to host a special guest from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation: Microsoft founder Bill Gates Jr., who had come to speak to the incoming Rotary officers on the Gates Foundation's involvement in PolioPlus. A few moments into his remarks, the room erupted in cheers at the announcement that Rotary's US\$100 Million Challenge had become Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge: The Gates Foundation would commit an additional \$250 million of funding, over and above its initial \$100 million contribution, and Rotary would agree to raise an additional \$100 million match by 30 June 2012.

This is a tremendous vote of confidence in our work, and its implications are spectacular. When we succeed in meeting this challenge, Rotary and the Gates Foundation will have brought an additional \$555 million of new funding to the polio eradication effort, at the time when it is most needed. Only four countries are still polio endemic, but those four present the greatest practical and epidemiological challenges. We are close to the final hurdle of this race – but the final hurdle is also the highest and will require the greatest effort from us all.

This money will be used for operational support, surveillance, and social mobilization – vital aspects for the success of the campaign. In order to make the world polio-free, we must be vigilant for signs of new cases, we must coordinate wellplanned and well-executed immunization days, and we must keep all our efforts organized for maximum efficiency and effectiveness. The hiring of town criers, the purchase of megaphones, the transportation of lab samples and vaccines, the mapping of villages to be sure not one child is missed – all of these needs are being met with the support of this challenge grant.

We are already close to halfway to raising our first \$100 million; in the three years ahead, we must, and will, raise a full \$200 million. We ask every Rotary club to carry out at least one fundraising event for polio eradication in each of these three years, and we especially ask newer Rotarians, and newer clubs, to be a strong part of this effort. We are so close to eradicating polio. We are so close to making this Rotary dream real. We should all be part of this incredible effort and this page in Rotary history.

#### THE DISTRICT NOMINATING COMMITTEE By PP Louie Gonzaga

ne of the tenets of Rotary is to develop Rotarians to become leaders, not only of their clubs, but to create a pool of leaders who will make up the District Leadership Team. To be precise, it is incumbent for clubs to prepare some of its leaders for the post of District Governor! This, being the highest ranking officer of Rotary International in the district.

District Governors begin their journey of governance as District Governor Nominees (DGN) having been chosen by a District Nominating Committee (DNC), composed of Past District Governors (PDG's) and fellow Past Presidents elected from six (6) Zones.

A candidate for District Governor must possess qualifications as spelled out in the latest Manual of Procedures. Among others, he/she must be a Past President of his/her Club, a Paul Harris Fellow, must have served his/her Club and District with distinction, and must be an active member and contributor to his/her community. Having established this, the candidate must be interviewed by the DNC at a specified time and place designated by the current District Governor.

In the interview, the candidate is expected to expound on his/her capabilities to lead, this includes his/her track records in serving both Club and District, and backed up with recognitions and awards. He/She is expected to lay out personal visions, goals, plans for the District (should he/she be nominated). Of course, personal integrity is a must!

Among the areas covered in the interview are:

- Personal Circumstances
- Service to Home Club (including Recognition and Awards)
- Non-Rotary/Community Involvement (including Recognition/Awards)
- Leadership Attributes

These are also the criteria for selection as well as the outline for the candidate's personal data and documents to be submitted to DNC.

The process, albeit tedious, is a very credible process for choosing a reliable District Governor! The DNC is the most credible medium for choosing reliable District Leaders. For RY 2011-12, the DNC has nominated PP Melvin dela Serna of the Rotary Club of Antique.

Tagged as the "summa cum laude" of the Rotary Club of Antique for saving the virtually unknown club of shambles when he became president in RY 1993-94, DGN Melvin received the Outstanding Club in the District Award which became a challenge and inspiration to succeeding presidents as he made the club one of the most active in the district. This Paul Harris Fellow is also an Attendance One Hundred Percenter for 16 years and has attended several R.I. Conventions. The perennial Outstanding Rotarian awardee of his club considers service as the main reason for his unwavering commitment to Rotary.



He was twice voted by the PNP Region 6 as Antique's Most Outstanding Civilian

in 1996 and 1999. He was also Most Outstanding Physician in 1996 and Physician of the Year for Private Practice in 2000, for Antique. Presently, he is leads the Drugstores Association of the Philippines - Antique Chapter.

### The 4 Way Test

From the earliest days of the organization, Rotarians were concerned with promoting high ethical standards in their professional lives. One of the



world's most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics is The 4-Way Test, which was created in 1932 by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor when he was asked to take charge of a company that was facing bankruptcy.

This 24-word test for employees to follow in their business and professional lives became the guide for sales, production, advertising, and all relations with dealers and customers, and the survival of the company is credited to this simple philosophy. Adopted by Rotary in 1943, The 4-Way Test has been translated into more than a hundred languages and published in thousands of ways.

#### THE FOUR-WAY TEST

Of the things we think, say or do:

- 1. Is it the TRUTH?
- 2. Is it FAIR to all concerned?
- 3. Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?
- 4. Will it be BENEFICIAL to all concerned?



#### LITERACY UPDATE

## ROTARY CLUB OF KALIBO'S HOME READING PROGRAM



The Home Reading Program is a means of extending the school day into the home. It involves parents in a daily learning activity with their children. Parents are the first and most important educators of their children. And all parents, even if illiterate, can remind their children of their nightly reading and writing activity.

The home reading program is a whole language approach to learning. It involves listening, speaking, reading, writing, viewing and interpreting illustrations and stimulates higher order thinking.

The process can be described in 6 steps.

- 1. Each day the teacher will read a short book or chapter of a book to her class, asking the students questions that will help them predict, analyze and evaluate.
- 2. Each student selects a book to take home at night.
- 3. The students read his book at home. A parent or sibling may read or listen to the book or chapter of a book if it is a longer book.
- The student will write the date and title of the book, and write a short comment in his or her notebook. (Notebooks and pencils are provided for free).
- 5. The students return their books to helping student monitors and select another book.
- 6. The teacher asks two students to describe the book they read the previous night. Every 3 weeks the teacher will collect and review the student notebooks.

The Home Reading Program began as a private project with financial donations from the families of Rotarians Frank and Tessie Kennedy. Books were purchased and sent door to door to Kalibo. The program involves students, parents and teachers helping children grow in their reading, listening, speaking, writing and viewing skills so that they will become better thinkers.

After the initial home reading launching in December 2008 with General F. Castillo Elementary School in Mabilo, Kalibo, the Rotary Club of Kalibo became

involved as major sponsor and the program was extended to Pinamuk-an Elementary School. Feedback from the schools was very positive with improved attendance and greater enthusiasm noted among students.

The approximate cost of the new books, used books, shipping notebooks, pencils and pens distributed during the first year of the program was C\$6,370 at P46 = P383,000.00.

With the additional sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Avalon Northeast St. John's, Newfoundland, Canada, the project was able to extend the home reading program to Grades 1-6 in Mabilo and Pinamuk-an and also provided notebooks and pencils to all students.


This March 2009, as we celebrate LITERACY MONTH, we have extended the HOME READING PROGRAM to Bulwang Elementary School, Camanci Norte Elementary School, Andagao Elementary School and Arcangel Sur Elementary School, and provided two boxes of books for students in Makato under DepEd's Alternative Learning System, as well as the children who had undergone surgery during the February 2009 Operation Taghoy in Kalibo. There are more on queue...

To date the total value of the program for 2008-09 is P1,113,060.00. If the government of the Phil's were to implement such a program it would cost more than double this amount.


This coming Rotary year, we hope to ship and distribute 10,000 books completing and augmenting the schools under the program as well as extending the program to other public elementary schools. Warehousing for 36 door to door boxes of books has already been arranged. What we will need in 2009-2010 is an enlarged team of Rotarians and educators who will be able to help in the distribution of books and the workshopping of parents and teachers.

Our long term goal is to continue this program indefinitely.










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## RC BACOLOD EAST HOSTS SEMINAR on Harmful Effects of Second-hand Smoke on Children

his year's Rotary International (RI) theme "Make Dreams Real" aims to reduce the child mortality rate and give children the chance at a long and full life. In fact, RI president Dong Kurn Lee asks us to focus on projects that will make a difference in the lives of children.

An article published in 2007 in the International Herald Tribune, stated that "the one social factor that researchers agree is linked to longer lives in every country where it has been studied is education. Year after year, in study after study, education keeps coming up". It is for this reason that the Rotary Club of Bacolod-East focuses its efforts on literacy projects. Our Club believes that education makes a difference and has a long-lasting effect on the lives of children.

Last December 11, 2008 we held a seminar on the "Harmful Effects of Second-hand Smoke on Children." Coordination played a vital role in the project as it turned out to be a joint project among four (4) organizations namely the Department of Social Services and Development (DSSD), the Philippine Academy of Family Physicians (PAFP), the Bacolod City Health Office and our Club.

The idea to hold a seminar on the "Harmful Effects of Second-hand Smoke on Children" did not come from thin air. The idea came about last year when we donated various equipments to a day-care center, and noticed that some parents of the pupils were smoking right in front of their children. We could not believe what we were seeing and vowed to do something about it. We did research on the topic and the seminar started to take shape. Our goal was to reach as many children as possible and what better way than to tap the officers of the day-care centers of Bacolod City. The plan was for the day-care officers to attend the seminar who will then echo their learnings to the over 5,000 day-care students of Bacolod City. A meeting was set with DSSD head, Mrs. Sally Abelarde,to brief her on our project. She welcomed the idea and gave her commitment to send the officers of all the day-care centers to the seminar.

The next step was to look for a speaker who could do justice to the topic. We wrote to Dra. Salome Biñas, the City Health Officer of the Bacolod City Health Department who recommended Dr. Jovy Vergara. We could not have asked for a better speaker as Dr. Jovy proved to be very knowledgeable on the topic being an advocate of the "No Smoking" campaign and having been the head of the Environmental Sanitation Division of the City Health Office for the past 15 years. Dr. Jovy also happens to be the Assistant City Health Officer of Bacolod City and president of the PAFP (Negros Chapter).

The seminar on the "Harmful Effects of Second-hand Smoke on Children" turned out to be a tremendous success with 96 day-care officers in attendance together with the presence of District Governor Emma Nava. After the seminar, hand-outs on the topic and certificates of attendance were given to the participants while photo releases of the seminar were published in a local newspaper (Visayan Daily Star) to create awareness for the project and share Rotary to the general public.

From Manila, Dipolog is just an hour by plane and from Cebu only thirty minutes also by plane. By sea, inter-island vessels regularly ply routes to Dipolog from Cebu, Dumaguete, Zamboanga and Manila. Roll on-roll off vessels ply the Dipolog-Dumaguete route several times a day. One can also travel by bus all over Mindanao from Dipolog.

#### WHAT TO DO

**Pagsalabuk Festival** – that was an annual crowd drawer. Pagsalabuk is a "Subanen" term which means



togetherness. The highlight of the festival is the street dancing which showcases the myriad interplay of cultures of the tri people of Mindanao – the Lumad, Moro and the settlers.

The festival usually starts on the 3rd week of April and culminates on the feast of Saint Vincent Ferrer celebrated every 3rd Saturday of May. Other festivals include the

Katkat Sakripisyo sa 3003 Steps to Linabo Peak, a mountain climbing/trekking activity and "via cruces" which takes place every Good Friday of Lent.



Other important activities include the **Adlaw sa Dipolog**, a celebration of the foundation day of Dipolog which falls on the 1st of July; Dahunog sa Dipolog, another festival that falls on the third week of September and culminates on the feast of Our Lady of the Most Holy Rosary on October 7. The highlight of the Dahunog Festival is the Parade Band competition and the Search for Ms. Teen Tourism; and another special event is the Pasko sa Dipolog (PASADI), a month- long display of Christmas decors and lights in strategic places of the city and nightly shows at the Dipolog Boulevard.

#### WHAT TO EAT

This progressive city has been considered by many individuals especially the foreigners, as an ideal place for retirement. Here, one can just walk to the malls and to the market to buy fresh fruits like mango, papaya, marang, durian, rambutan, lanzones and mangosteen. Fresh catch of seafoods such as shrimps, prawns, crabs, yellow fin tuna, shellfish, clams, oysters to name a few are abundant and available in the Central Market in very affordable prices. As well as bottled sardines, tinagaktak, bibingka and puto bumbong.



#### WHAT TO SEE



Sungkilaw Falls – The 3003 Steps to Linabo Peak is one of the favorites and desired destinations of our local and foreign tourist as it offers a fantastic view of the twin cities of Dipolog and Dapitan, the sky, plains and sea horizon after trailing the 3003 concrete steps wind along the tunnels of verdant trees.

**Cogon Eco-Park** – a 344 hectares reforestation area situated in Barangay Cogon established in 1958. Tourists who visited the area were all amazed gazing the matured trees growing wild with different species like Mahogany, Teak, Yemane, Lumbayao, Molave,

Dakak Beach Resort – unwinding while tasting sweet mango and fresh coconut juice. Sicayab Beach – is a 7kilometer stretch of fine gray sand. It's just 4 kilometers away from the city proper and is a

favorite haven of holiday and weekend crowd. It is accessible by motor cabs.

#### Estaka-Turno Y junction Fountain - the statutes represent

the tri-people of Mindanao, which symbolize the diverse cultures prevailing in Dipolog. The bowl raised to heavens is a gesture of thanksgiving and offering to God Almighty for the generous outpouring of graces and blessings, bountiful harvests and sustained peace and prosperity.

- Personal Growth and Development: Membership in Rotary continues one's growth and education in human relations and personal development.
- Leadership Development: Rotary is an organization of leaders and successful people. Serving in Rotary positions is like a college education. Leadership: learning how to motivate, influence, and lead leaders.
- Citizenship in the Community: Membership in a Rotary club makes one a better community citizen. The average Rotary club consists of the most active citizens of any community.
- Continuing Education: Each week at Rotary there is a program designed to keep one informed about what is going on in the community, nation, and world. Each meeting provides an opportunity to listen to different speakers and a variety of timely topics.
- Fun: Rotary is fun, a lot of fun. Each meeting is fun. The club projects are fun. Social activities are fun. The service is fun.
- **Public Speaking Skills:** Many individuals who joined Rotary were afraid to speak in public. Rotary develops confidence and skill in public communication and the opportunity to practice and perfect these skills.
- Citizenship in the World: Every Rotarian wears a pin that says "Rotary International." There are few places on the globe that do not have a Rotary club. - Entertainment: Every Rotary club and district has parties and activities that provide diversion in one's business life. Rotary holds conferences, conventions, assemblies, and institutes that provide entertainment in addition to Rotary information, education, and service.

- The Development of Social Skills: Every week and at various events and functions, Rotary develops one's personality, social skills and people skills. Rotary is for people who like people.
- Family Programs: Rotary provides one of the world's largest youth exchange programs; high school and college clubs for future Rotarians; opportunities for spouse involvement; and a host of activities designed to help family members in growth and the development of family values.



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
