


PETS IN CEBU

FROM THE RIPRESIDENT

Dear fellow Rotarians,

The magazine you hold in your hands is one of Rotary's oldest traditions. In January of 1911, a 12-page newsletter called *The National Rotarian* was published; it contained an essay by Paul Harris, "Rational Rotarianism," along with club news and editorials. Of the new publication, Harris wrote: "The primary purpose of *The National Rotarian* is to provide a means for the exchange of ideas between Rotarians throughout the world, not to give the national officers an opportunity to express their views. These messages are not written merely to fill space; nevertheless we look forward to the day when they will be literally crowded out by surging mobs of virile Rotarian ideas struggling to be heard."

Today, with Rotary's club membership spanning more than 200 countries and geographical areas, the mandate of its publications is more complex, and more vital, than ever. The English-language flagship magazine, *The Rotarian*, is edited at RI headquarters in Evanston, III., USA, and has a circulation of about 500,000. Around the world, 31 more magazines are published in 24 other languages, for a total of 32 magazines published by the Rotary World Magazine Press, and a total circulation of about 1.25 million.

The RI Board of Directors has designated April of every year as Magazine Month. It is a time to recognize the role that our Rotary publications play in our Rotary lives – and the role that we should play in our publications. For the magazines to live up to Paul Harris' original vision, it takes more than just an editorial staff: It also takes the good work of



Rotarians. I always feel that the best part of reading any Rotary publication is the opportunity to find out what other clubs are doing. Each issue, each article, is a chance to be informed and inspired.

In an era when electronic communication seems to be everywhere, the role of the paper-and-ink magazine is still important to our organization. Rotary magazines provide us with an overview of what's happening in different clubs and districts as well as important news and updates from RI headquarters. Even the many Rotarians who regularly visit www.rotary.org_will find something new in every issue.

It is a privilege today to be writing this message as Paul Harris once wrote his, and to see his vision of this publication – a magazine filled with the great ideas and great works of Rotarians – brought to life.


SUBSCRIPTIONS TO ROTARY MAGAZINE Article 14, Manual of Procedure 2007


Section 1 Mandatory Subscriptions

Unless, in accordance with the by laws of RI, a club is excused by the board of directors of RI from complying with the provisions of this article, each member shall for the duration of membership, subscribe to the official magazine or to the magazine approved and prescribed for the club by the board of directors of RI. The Subscription shall be paid in six (6) month period during which membership may terminate.

Section 2 Subscription Collection

The subscription shall be collected by the club from each member semiannually in advance and remitted to the Secretariat of RI or to the office of such regional publications as may be determined by the board of directors of RI.








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

Humanitarian Grants

RI/USAID International H2O Collaboration

Rotarians may apply for grants in amounts from US\$100,000 to \$300,000 to carry out water, sanitation, and hygiene projects in Ghana, the Philippines, and the Dominican Republic through an alliance between Rotary International and the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID). Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grants will support Rotary club and district involvement with these projects.

This partnership between RI and USAID is an official Global Development Alliance (GDA), which is an innovative public-private alliance model developed and used by USAID for improving social and economic conditions in developing countries. The GDA combines the assets and experience of strategic partners, such as RI. The GDA leverages its capital and investments, creativity, and access to markets to solve complex problems facing government, business, and communities.


"We intend these projects to be models for future projects with strategic partners and in this way to enhance our contribution to world understanding, goodwill, and peace."

PP Lan Villaruz was D-3850 Governor in RY 1999-2000. Here are some of his reminisces on his governorship and words to live by:

"I served under RI President Carlo Revizza who's from Milan, Italy. Our RI theme then was quite a long one, "Act with Consistency, Credibility and Continuity." "My District Secretary was PP Allan Marasigan, MD. He left shortly to practice medicine in the United States.

"Our district major programs then adhered to RI President Carlo's advocacies. At our level, I also endeavored to give Rotary a face that non-Rotarians could connect with.

"Beyond the club projects in our district then was the philosophy that strengthening the genuine concept of service among Rotarians was a worthy enterprise. I saw this task greater than building physical structures that could not withstand the onslaught of time.

"Although still active in the practice of law, I have successfully divided my time between this and doing professional engagements.



"I do serious research on comparative religions. I am presently compiling materials for an inspirational book which transcends the boundaries of sectarianism. Hopefully this will see print shortly."

Asked for his advice so Rotarians will remain as Rotarians, he replied:

"Develop a deep religious fervor for Rotary may help. After all, Rotary shares a common bedrock with all great faiths – charity."

How the funding is organized between RI and USAID

The RI and USAID funds will share project funding, with funding to be distributed separately and independently. This allows for budgeting, expenditures, and reporting mechanisms to be kept completely separate between the two organizations.

Why water, sanitation, and hygiene projects were selected by RI and USAID

Today, more than 1.1 billion people lack access to safe drinking water, and 2.5 billion people lack access to improved sanitation. Each year, 1.8 million people -- 90 percent of them children under age five -- die from preventable diarrheal diseases. Diarrheal diseases and related malnutrition account for virtually all of the deaths and nearly 90 percent of the overall disease burden associated with unsafe water supply, sanitation, and hygiene. Therefore, activities in these areas are key health interventions. (Source: Senator Paul Simon Water for the Poor Act Report to Congress, June 2008)

The United Nations Millennium Development Goals address this situation in goal 7: Ensure environmental sustainability. Within that goal is the target to "halve, by 2015, the proportion of the population without sustainable access to safe drinking water and basic sanitation."

The relationship between the RI/USAID International H2O Collaboration and the Future Vision Plan

While the alliance was developed separately from The Rotary Foundation's Future Vision Plan, the concept of strategic partnerships with other organizations has become a vital part of the plan's new grant-making model. Packaged Rotary Foundation Global Grants will leverage funding, advocacy, and technical expertise of other organizations to develop large-scale projects for Rotarians to implement.

URPRISED but highly elated, Aklan Gov. Carlito Marquez noted that, "This is the first time that I've seen in this province such a massive distribution of wheelchairs that even us in the government haven't done yet."

The governor made this remark on Feb. 24, 2009, at Apsta Teachers Center in Kalibo, Aklan, being the invited guest of honor during the wheelchair distribution of the Rotary Club of Metro

Kalibo in partnership with Operation Blessing wherein 100 physically handicapped indigents in the province of Aklan took home a specially-designed wheelchair complete with a tool kit and strap especially for young beneficiaries.

The program is a continuing project of the Rotary Club of Metro Kalibo (RCMK) and Operation Blessing that was galvanized after these two organizations partnered during the Typhoon Frank relief missions.

"We are thankful for maintaining a strong alliance with other organizations for us to adapt, innovate and be even more responsive and relevant to the needs of our community in response to the programs and challenges of Making Dreams Real," noted the youthful and energetic RCMK President Rod Solidum.

"Governor Marquez was right. This distribution was made special considering that not only 10, 20, or even 50 dreams have been granted but 100, the first of its kind so far in the province of Aklan that is why we are very thankful to the collective leadership and cooperation of RC Metro Kalibo and our partners in having these dreams by our beneficiaries fulfilled," he said, adding: "Although, in fact, this is supposed to be more because we have an allocation of 150 wheelchairs for distribution but considering that only 100 were able to submit the requirements needed to avail of the project we decided to set another batch of distribution this year."

Owning to this stronger support and cooperation, President Rod said RC Metro Kalibo promises to make a considerable effort not only in wheelchair distribution but also in all its services favorable to the needs of the community.

he humble beginnings of the "Greatest Gift of All" trace back to Rotary Year 1994-1995, when three Rotarians, Edwin Caliolio, Patrick Lee and Bash Adil, all from the Rotary Club of Zamboanga City West went to visit the Baliwasan Central School for a proposed project. While having snacks near one of the gates of the school, these Rotarians were approached by several street children and disabled kids begging for alms and food. The three Rotarians just gave them candies then but resolved to pursue a bigger activity that would group the kids together so they can be fed and dressed properly. That saw the start... of the Greatest Gift of All, which was henceforth, proposed by the three as a club project. From the low-key and simple distribution of goodies to a handful of kids, to its present form of giving food stuff, educational materials and equipment to over a thousand of our downtrodden brethren that include orphans, street children, the disabled, the blind and deaf-mute, as well as the abandoned elderly.

PE Emil Aquino, 1995 Co-Project Chairman aptly gave the name of the project: The Greatest Gift of All, which has since become an annual event sponsored by RCZC West with its Anns' Club during the Yuletide Season of Giving for the last fifteen years. It is a Christmas Party for "Special People" to include those who are differently abled and educated under the auspices of the Special Educational Program (SPED); the street children of St. Francis House for Orphans; the abandoned elderly wards of the Home for the Aged; and the PWDs (people with disabilities) of the Department of Social Welfare and Development (DSWD)-sponsored Centers.

From a spontaneous distribution of goodies by three Rotarians, the project has progressed to involve the entire club. Before, most Rotarians were involved in individual gift-giving activities during the Christmas season. The concept of the project is to come up with an integrated giftgiving activity under one roof following the Biblical call: "Whatsoever you do to the least of my brethren, this you do unto me." The project has since mutated into its largescale form whereby, more beneficiaries from different NGOs and SPED centers are catered to and the idea of making our less fortunate brothers and sisters enjoy the comforts of a plush hotel during the special Yuletide season. Thus, the contributions of Rotarians and their respective companies as well as the donations of the friends of Rotary are coursed thru this integrated and highimpact project to address the needs of the beneficiaries. This significant project brings a smile to the otherwise physically, mentally and even emotionally challenged individuals especially the young special children who enjoy a grand Christmas treat while gaining the opportunity to show their own worth and special talents to their peers and benefactors. The Greatest Gift of All is not the gift that Rotarians give to themselves, their spouses, their children or to their relatives and friends, but the gift that really means so much for those who have less in life or suffer under challenging circumstances.

The project started with a series of meetings convened by the Project Chairman (PP Jose Vicente Atilano III for

this Rotary year) together with his Committee members and the representatives of the targeted NGOs, DSWD and SPED Centers. The representatives presented the needs/wish list of their respective institutions and the Project Committee evaluated the same. For needs involving construction and repair works, the architect-members of the club did the estimates and assessment. For repairs of gadgets and equipment, the appliance and repair shop entrepreneur-members handled the same. The doctor-members prescribed the right medicines appropriate for the requesting centers, while other club members helped in procuring gadgets, educational supplies, fruits, noodles, goodies and other food items thru their supplier friends. Other members contributed cash, while some members helped solicit from friends of Rotary and their associates. After rounding up donations, the Rotarians then personally helped in sorting and packaging the donated items into cartons with the assistance of their Anns. A group of ten Rotarians handled the actual transport and delivery of the items to the site (Astoria Regency at Pasonanca). Aside from helping in the sorting and distribution of the donated items and Christmas goodies, the Anns and Rotakids rendered entertainment numbers to the delight of the poor kids. To remove a pure dole-out connotation, the beneficiaries performed their own Christmas presentations and those adjudged as having presented the best numbers were duly awarded and recognized.

Though the task at hand was overwhelming, the club was able to deliver all (100%) of the beneficiaries' wish list from the different institutions to include TV sets, karaoke, crutches, wheelchairs, rice cookers, VCD/DVD players, tape recorders, full body mirrors, sports and exercise equipment, educational materials, reference books, food supplies, as well as, repair and construction works.

Last year's Christmas gifts amounted to over P200,000 which were given directly to the beneficiaries in the

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
presence of the club's special guests in the person of Mayor Celso Lobregat and Congresswoman Isabella Climaco.

As the biggest showcase project of RCZC West and its Anns Club, the entire proceedings showing the Rotarians, Anns and Rotakids celebrate the grand Christmas Party with special children, orphans, elderly, deaf-mutes, people with disabilities, was aired on the Community Channel of Skycable (a major sponsor of the project) on Christmas Day (December 25, 2008) and New Year's Day (January 1, 2009).

The unity of the club members really played a great role in making the affair a successful one. From ferrying the beneficiaries to and from the venue, to the registration, club presentation, the program proper, and even the distribution of gifts were done in a very systematic way. Other Rotary clubs can adopt the same integrated and large-scale Christmas party model for our less fortunate

brothers and sisters. Rotarians as selfless individuals, as a practice, do share their blessings during the Yuletide season of gift-giving except that they normally undertake this individually and in different venues. The impact is greater if the distribution is done jointly under one roof while allowing the beneficiaries to convene and enjoy themselves in one grand Christmas celebration.

From a handful of kids to a hundred — over the years — to more than a thousand now...The Greatest Gift of All is certainly a high-impact and exemplary portrayal of how RI and Rotarians can make the rather elusive dream, of a joyful Christmas for those who hunger and suffer, a delightful reality.

Subayen Keg Subano Festival - a week-long festivity marking the feast of Nuestra Señora del Street dancing which highlights the lifestyles of the Subanons as depicted in songs, dances, and other forms of simulated social expression,

participated by different private/public schools, 51 barangays, and government contingents, using creative costumes and props; they parade and mime along the

streets, that gives way to the genuine, authentic Subanon culture and pageantry enacted for both show and benediction.

The Bells of Bukagan Hill - a tourist in Ozamiz City should never miss seeing the tower of the four great bells at the top of Bukagan Hill. They are worth the sweat and tires feet if one attempts to go up the hill on foot or the different phobias one experiences as the vehicle goes up. Aside from the wonder of the bells one gets a bonus, the beautiful scenarios around including the panorama of Ozamiz.

Fort Santiago: The Cotta of Ozamiz City – the Fort Santiago is located at the mouth of the Panguil Bay just

behind the shrine. It was built in 1756 and has been the military stronghold from then and until now. Historical relics and records were displayed in the Fort's museum. It is also where the lighthouse was erected.



Malindang Country Golf Course – a pre-war army facility



converted into a beautiful golf course lush with wellmaintained greens, located at the foot of Malindang Mountain

The Pipe Organ of the Immaculate Conception Cathedral

- a tourist attraction right at the heart of Ozamiz is the pipe organ found in the choir loft of the Immaculate Conception Cathedral. It is the only existing pipe organ in Mindanao and one among the few throughout the country.

FAQ: Philippine Rotary Magazine



The Philippine Rotary is the official regional magazine for Rotary Club members in the Philippines authorized by Rotary International. It is a member of the Rotary World Magazine Press. There are ten districts in the Philippines with about 700 Rotary clubs and 20,000 members ("Rotarians"). The magazine contains articles and features about Rotary in the Philippines and abroad. Guided by the editorial policies of Rotary International, it contains articles found in the current issue of The Rotarian, Rotary International's official publication for all Rotarians worldwide, and articles and features of local (Philippine) interest. It is published by the Philippine College of Rotary Governors (PCRG). An Editorial Board consisting of volunteer Rotarians manages the magazine with a salaried editorial staff.

What is the PCRG?

The Philippine College of Rotary Governors (PCRG) is an association of past, present and incoming Districts Governors, whose purpose is to promote close coordination and camaraderie among the ten Rotary Districts in the Philippines with the common goal of supporting the various programs, policies and objectives of Rotary International in the spirit of fellowship. A District Governor heads each Rotary district.

How do I submit a story on our club project?

The following guidelines will help you present your idea for consideration:

- Tell WHAT happened, WHERE it happened, WHEN it happened, HOW it happened, WHY it happened, and WHO made it happen.
- Emphasize Human Interest. Example: Instead of reporting on a cheque presentation ceremony, focus instead on WHO benefitted from the donation or WHAT was the benefit of your club's fund raising efforts.
- Provide comments and quotes from club members and others.
- Include newspaper clippings and/or any other informational materials.
- ✓ List the name of a contact person, phone/fax numbers and e-mail address for more information.
- Articles should be typewritten and submitted in printed and preferably in digital form (CD or as an attachment to e-mail in MS Word format).

What kind of pictures do you prefer?

We need pictures that tell the story.

- The best images show action that have human interest and present a subject in an unusual way. Photographs that perfectly catch a moment are generally an exception; keep in mind that most require some set-up and posing. Your goal is to create an image that appears candid and natural.
- Please send pictures with clear faces and surroundings, and those with clear, not dark, background.
- When writing on the back of photographs, be careful not to use ink that may smudge on the photograph under it. Use a separate sheet of paper for information such as names, descriptions or captions and photo credits, cross-indexed by a number indicated at the back of the photo (avoid ink smudging).
- We prefer colour prints. We accept scanned pictures in high resolution (300 pixels) saved on CD or emailed as an attachment in "jpg" format.
- Protect your photographs when mailing by placing them in a hard pouch, and specify if you would like them returned.

Why has my/our submitted article not been published? Some articles do not see print because they lack details or given lower priority over other articles in the exercise of editorial prerogative, since we have a limited number of pages. Some articles are also mis-sent or are lost in transit. While some articles may be featured in future issues if space permits, we cannot guarantee publication.

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
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
