## ZAMBO ROTARY CLUBS / PCGA SEND RELIEF GOODS FOR JOLO FLOOD VICTIMS

The Rotary International District 3850 Zones 10 and 11 Disaster Management Team in cooperation with the Philippine Coast Guard Auxiliary (PCGASWM) conducted last February 19, 2011 their Joint Relief Operations for the Jolo flood victims.

Responding to the call for relief goods, RC of Zamboanga City West donated 6 boxes of food stuff and clothing plus 13 sacks of bedding and 6 boxes of medicines courtesy of PCSO under Dir. Raul Regondola; RCZC (Mother Club) gave 3 sacks of rice and 25 kgs. of sugar; RC of Zamboanga City North gave 6 boxes of mineral water; and RC of Metro Zamboanga gave one box of assorted items.

The PCGASWM under Comm. Josue Lee made arrangements with CG Capt. Eden for the free

transportation of the relief goods thru KS Beatrice and the free passage of four officers of the Rotaract Club of Zamboanga City West who escorted the shipment to include Pres. Lucky Anidem; VP JojoSaavedra; STI and ADZU Rotaract Moderators Al Cali and Bryan Callao. PCGA 307th Squadron Director Butch Izquierdo represented the Municipality of Jolo in receiving the goods while Disaster Management Team Deputy for Operations Oca Zaragoza and Deputy for Administration Emilio Aquino jointly led in the formal turnover of said relief items and witnessed by Lady Tess Makasiar, the officers and Annsof RCZC West led by Pres. Erwin Bernardo and Ann Pres. Brenda Aquino; RCZC East by Pres. Rene Quijano and RCZC North by Pres. Eugene de Asis.

Keep it simple

When I first joined Rotary in 1961, I often heard Rotary leaders say “Keep Rotary Simple.” In fact, that phrase was part of the RI theme in 1956-57! However, as Rotary has grown in both the number of members and the number of programs during the last 50 years, simplicity has become more difficult.

The revised RI Strategic Plan for 2010-13 is a refreshingly simple approach to keeping Rotary strong and vibrant in the future. The three priorities of the plan are clear and brief statements calling us to (1) support and strengthen our clubs, (2) focus and increase our humanitarian service, and (3) enhance our public image and awareness.

It is a true strategic plan because each of the three priorities has a list of measurable goals, and in turn, there is a scorecard to track progress of all the goals. We are realigning the RI budget to reflect the new priorities, and we are trying to balance the priorities in all RI activities. Even the breakout sessions at the 2011 convention in New Orleans will be balanced between the three priorities. The new plan with the simply stated priorities will not be left to merely gather dust on an office shelf!

Please note the interdependence of the three priorities. We have recognized for many years that Rotary cannot provide exemplary service projects without strong clubs and that clubs cannot recruit and retain high-quality members without significant service projects. The third priority now recognizes that in the modern world, Rotary needs the support of our communities, of partner organizations, and sometimes of governments, to conduct larger service projects, which in turn build stronger clubs.

Rotary is now on the world stage due to PolioPlus. But we are still a grassroots organization, and our strength is dependent on the health of our clubs. The three priorities of the strategic plan remind us that the success of Rotary is based on a simple formula of strong clubs, significant service projects, and a favorable public image. Thanks to Paul Harris and other Rotary pioneers, it is a simple formula that produces extraordinary results – and a better world!

## A Friendship Tour in Amazing Thailand

After a bumpy plane ride of three hours, our group arrived at Bangkok a little past one o'clock a.m. (Phil. Time) on November 18, 2010. Our tour group consisted of a total of eight couples led by DG James and Lady Tess Makasiar. The rest were: DS Butch and Ivy Blanco, AG Oca and Ann PP Sheila Zaragoza, Ann Pres. Brenda and I, Rtn. Tonton and Ann PP Lynna Alegata, Rtn. Patrick and Ann PP Beth Lee, Rtn. Gil and Ann PP Marlyn Lim, and Dir. Raul and Gigi Regondola (the latter couple arrived two hours earlier). We were met at the airport by hosts-Rotarians who had a van to transport us to Imperial Queen's Park Hotel. From there, we took a taxi to Royal Parkview Hotel where we were billeted..... which was just a stone's throw away from Queen's Park Hotel, the official venue of the Bangkok Institute. Feeling hungry after that long flight, we did not allow the unholy hour to keep us from proceeding to Sukumbhit Road to eat the popular sidewalk vended food. They tasted very good (Dee Mak in local Thai).

We then headed back to our hotel where we were all booked in just one floor.

We were up and running by 10 am just after a few winks of sleep... and then proceeded to the Golden Temple to kowtow before the Holy Buddha... drop a few baht offering for the temple and then have a memory stick load-full of pics. Next stop was the famous Wat Poh Buddhist temple. It is the oldest in Bangkok where one can find the Reclining Buddha. Within the temple premises were four pagodas which represented the first four Ramas (Kings) including that of Rama IV of the "King and I" popularity. More pics abound. Then we went to MBK mall where we ate the best of Thai food to include Tom Yang shrimp soup and Pad Thai.... exotically spicy and very delicious. After a sky train ride from Siam Paragon, we walked back to our hotel to wash up. Around 7:30 pm, we rushed to River City where Chao Phraya Princess 4 was berthed to take us for our River Cruise. The dinner was great and so was the

entertainment. We danced and sang with the Pinay band together with some elderly Chinese Rotarians who were also having a good time during that river cruise. A local Thai show ensued in d o w n t o w n Bangkok which was swamped with visiting Rotarians clad in club shirts. We went back to our hotel so exhausted but fully entertained.

The following day, after a couple of hours ride, we reached the Damnoen Saduak Floating Market. We took the bangka ride thru the river canal. We bought fruits and souvenirs from vendors along the river banks. We passed thru the scene shown in Bangkok Dangerous starring Nicolas Cage. Famished by the river



adventure, we went to eat in a nearby resto. The food was great. Fried rice had run short initially. We ate sea bass, Pad Thai and Kangkong among others. The fruits were all extraordinarily sweet. Then we proceeded to the Samphran Elephant Ground and Zoo. We had a

While heading our way back to Bangkok proper, we noted the Thai expressways to be very much identical to our SLEX and NLEX. Noteworthy also was the fact that pickup vehicles (like Hilux and Navara) were carrier vehicles used to transport business stuff. Most of these SUVs were converted into closed delivery vans.... talk about the entrepreneurial orientation of the Thai people.

While we did arrive at the Queen's Park Hotel to inquire for our registration, we learned that the registration table was already closed with a swelling number of over 1,200 registered delegates. The organizers didn't expect that overwhelming turnout of Rotarians and had in fact run short of kits and were already in a panic mode. We opted then to skip the Institute altogether.

We then went around to scout for a dining place. After a rather long walk (for over an hour), we settled for a resto near Queen's Park Hotel. Brenda ordered the spiciest food ever. We didn't get to eat it but DS Butch

had a stronger palate and finished the fiery food. Then Thai foot massage was next on our list. We trooped to the nearby massage centers where we got a delightful respite and pampering for our overworked feet. For 300 baht, you get quite reinvigorated to cover more ground.

Henceforth on the following day, we started combing Thailand's shopping paradise. First stop was Siam Paragon. We had a grand time eating free taste food. Hope the children were there...they enjoyed munching all the free taste food stuff offered in our local supermarkets. In the afternoon, we went to MBK. We stayed there until 8 pm. Returned to our hotel and then had a very enjoyable nightcap with Gov. James and Lady Tess Makasiar at the nearby Emerald Green Garden. We had tons of laughter...because we were "bungol".

The next day, Nov. 21 was still another free shopping time. We spent our time at Platinum Paragon. It was a great shopping mall for women as it caters exclusively to fashion items. That meant Bangko time for me, Tonton and Raul, just waiting our wifey until they were done with their almost endless shopping. For our lunch, I enjoyed fried rice and stewed pork while Brenda had her walang kamatayan na Pad Thai. The stalls used coupons to sell meals...which

By 9:00 pm we were at the Asia Hotel where we watched the alluring Calypso C a b a r e t . L a d y b o y s performed Vegas and Cancan dances...Japanese and Korean

numbers with a touch of comedy. Sulit...we said of the 500 baht we each paid for the show plus a complimentary drink. Normally, its 1,200 baht per person. Again, a group of 16 was considered wholesale which translates to a whole lot of discounts in Bangkok. For a nightcap, we settled at Patrick's suite...which was the largest among our rooms. We had a taste of the Thai Chang and Leo Beer. We had a good round of laughter while our Anns were busy packing up our things. Slept around midnight.

Nov. 22 was used up for last minute shopping. We went to MBK where Brenda bought Thai food pasalubongs.....pork stick, sampaloc, dried durian and so many others. Then we went to Siam Paragon

## Career Coaching for Fourth Year Students of TTNHS

Once again, the **SERVICE ABOVE SELF** commitment of the **Rotary Club of Zamboanga City North** under **Pres. Eugene F. De Asis** has started the year 2011 with the **CAREER COACHING** to almost 250 graduating students of **Talon-Talon National High School (TTNHS)**, this city on Wednesday, January 26, 2011. This activity is in line with **President Benigno Aquino's** program of guiding the youth in choosing the right

career as early as they are still in the elementary up to the secondary level of their education. The objective of this activity is to avoid **mismatch** in searching and getting the first employment right after graduation in college. Most of the fresh graduates are discouraged when after many months of job searching and job hunting, still can not get that awaited first employment despite complete requirements such as

the transcript of records, good moral character, recommendations from well known personalities, due to mismatch or over supply of graduates of a particular course than the jobs available in the labor market.

The fourth year students of TTNHS were gathered at the second floor of the building near the Talon-Talon national road preparing for the career coaching activity. This was participated in by the Technical Support Services Division (TSSD) of the Department of Labor 9 (DOLE 9), the Social Security System Region 9 (SSS 9), and other successful professionals in the business sector, academic sector especially the guidance counselors in various colleges and universities in Zamboanga City.

**Mr. Felix Patajo** of DOLE informed the graduating students the most in demand jobs in Region 9 and the difference between **white collar jobs and blue collar jobs**. He emphasized that 10-15 years ago the trend was more on the white collar jobs but this time the trend has change and that blue collar jobs are now more in demand most particularly if the applicants are highly competent for the positions available. **Mrs. Shella Tumbagahan Ducales**, the guidance counselor of Zamboanga State College of Marine Science and Technology and at the same time the president of the Career Guidance Counselor Network Zamboanga – Basilan Peninsula elaborated more on the basic requirement of choosing a course coupled with the results of the National Career Assessment Examination NCAE. With the appropriate guidance of teachers, parents, and the choice of the schools where the course is offered and

most especially the interest and aptitude of the fourth year students. All these may lead to the most accurate course to take.

**Atty. Jack Felizarta** of the SSS elaborated the importance of lawyers in every government organizations in the Philippines although in some private firms there are less demands for lawyers. He emphasizes that students who are interested in the law profession should take first any four year Bachelors degree, before enrolling LLB. Students were advised to develop in depth reading to become successful in the bar examinations. An LLB graduate who did not pass the bar examination cannot be called a lawyer.

**Mrs. Ma. Pinky B. Saavedra** wife of Rotarian Delfin Saavedra a shell dealer of Ayala Shell Corp. herself shared her experiences as nurse entrepreneur. She elaborates more on the three Ps to become successful in any career: these are passion, perspiration/persistence and prayer. At least the person has to invest Time, Talent and Treasure in any activity he/she is involved. Our very own **Past President Oscar Macrohon** shared his life time experiences from high school, college life and his employment in different firms before he became an officer of a bank. Being smart as a student and choosing the right course led him to what he is now.

**Ann Pres. Maleene de Asis** elaborated more on the importance of non - degree courses that are **TESDA** accredited. These are short term courses and if the students are hopeful to get the first employment right after graduation they may consider taking up short term courses

# RCZC heals earth, reaches out to people

The Rotary Club of Zamboanga City (RCZC) conducted a medical-dental cum environmental project at Sta. Cruz Island last February 27.

In coordination with the Zamboanga City Health Office (ZCHO), around 300 inhabitants of this beautiful island were check up by medical doctors and dentists for free. The islanders also received free medicines. The men, women, and children of Sta. Cruz were elated and grateful to RCZC particularly ZCHO Officer and Rotarian Dr. Rodel Agbulos for heading the medical-dental team.

While the medical-dental team were doing their humanitarian work, RCZC launched their Adopt-A-Mangrove Site at this island with the support of the City Environment and Natural Resources Office (CENRO) Personnel Virgil Valdez and Elpidio Barrera. About 1,000 mangrove seedlings were planted at the back of Sta. Cruz Island by the group braving sticky mud, bites from insects, and sharp stones.

Mangroves along the



coastal shore play an important role in the ecosystem. Not only do they serve as nesting areas for crustaceans, fishes, and migratory birds, it protects the coastal areas from erosion. Worldwide there is a campaign to conserve and plant mangroves trees to prevent negative effects of climate change according to scientific studies.

The newly organized Interact Club of Zamboanga City (ICZC) helped and assisted RCZC in these noble projects. Composed of high school students from different

schools, ICZC is the first community based Interact Club. This club is composed of young people with age

ranging from 14-18. They are mentored by Rotarians to be responsible young citizens and principled leaders.
