Cruz Island beach. They played bowling at Tebi and Sean; did a courtesy call at City Hall; and turned over the water connection at the Lumayang Elementary School (this was jointly sponsored by Gov. He went to the Lincoln Christian High School for his one-year Rotex Program. RJ Go was the male partner of the Power RYLarian couple during the New Inland Resort RYLA Youth Camp last November 20-22, 2009.

On the other hand, Val Mercury Faburada, the recipient of the Leadership Plum during that New Inland Resort RYLA Youth Camp was among those chosen to undergo the five-week Philippine Youth Leadership Program in Illinois this summer. PYLP is funded by the US State Department. It is an inter-ethnic dialogue and conflict resolution program which brings Muslims, Lumad and Christian youth to Northern Illinois University in Dekalb, Illinois. Val will do a re-entry project once he returns to Zamboanga City.

CLUBS IN ACTION

3K LITERACY PROGRAM

The District's 3K Literacy Program *“Kabataang Kapakanan sa Kinabukasan”* with its pilot activity , *Integral Values Formation among the Youth Seminar* was launched recently at the **YOUTH CONGRESS** hosted by RC Oroquieta Centennial and RC Ozamiz North on May 25, 2011 in Cotta Museum, Ozamiz City .

The program commenced with a Signing of Memorandum of Understanding among the stakeholders: the City Government of Ozamiz represented by Mayor Nova Princess E. Parojinog-Echavez; City Social Welfare and Development (CSWD), Officer Ludie Salud Raras, Pag-Asa Youth Association of the Phils., Inc. (PYAP) –Ozamiz Chapter President, Radjie Gomez, Rotary Club of Ozamiz, President Sonny Co represented by its Incoming President Richard Centino and District Literacy Group Coordinator, PP Lina Pacio.

Youth leaders from different barangays of Ozamiz City who are members of the Pag-asa Youth Association of the Philippines attended the whole day seminar. Resource speakers from different sectors discussed fundamental topics to address prevalent problems among the youth: *“No to Illegal Drugs”, “ No to Alcohol and Smoking,” “No to Pre-marital Sex”, “Domestic Conflict and Violence affecting the Youth”* and provided practical remedies to manage the situation including **Youth Leadership Enlightenment**.

The program will be cascaded annually on a **province-wide scale (3 Cities and 14 Municipalities)** starting July 2011 with five thousand **(5,000)** target attendees composed of out-of -school youth and in-school graduating high school students per Municipality/City of Misamis Occidental.

I. SUMMARY:

The 3K Literacy Program of RI District 3850 is a Comprehensive Community-based Literacy Program designed to address the common problems affecting Education, Water and Sanitation, and Health and Hunger which are Rotary International's three major focus. Under this program, are various specialized projects dubbed as **“KABATAANG KAPAKANAN SA KINABUKASAN”** for Literacy-Education which highlights the 5th Avenue of Service in Rotary, New Generations-Youth Service. and **“KAALAMAN, KALINGA AT KAAYUSAN”** for Water-Sanitation and Hunger and Health (e.g. *Proper Hygiene and Illness Prevention (eg. Dengue)*)

It is a continuing program which bridges and mobilizes the key players of the local community in bringing quality, timely and effective literacy advocacy service to the people. In order to ensure sustainability, stewardship and administration of the 3K Literacy Program, it shall be under the local Rotary Club in collaboration with the other stakeholders of the community.

II. VISION:

Build a united, dynamic community service network founded on literacy advocacy ideals geared towards a sustainable community development; a better place and a better world for us to live in.

III: MISSION:

In building communities become a better place to live and work with, Rotary shall take an active role in providing support and valuable services by collaborating with local service providers especially on youth-oriented literacy programs and community-based literacy advocacies on Water-Sanitation and Hunger and Health.

Rotary shall ensure effectiveness and sustainability in the implementation of the program and its proper monitoring. Along the process, Rotary should be able to share to other people and organization its core values of service above self, fellowship, diversity, integrity and leadership.

Residents in two poor neighborhoods of Zamboanga City, Philippines have clean drinking water because of a project supported by the International H2O Col-laboration, an alliance between Rotary International and USAID.

The effort, sponsored by the Rotary clubs of Armadale, Western Australia, Australia, and Zamboanga City West, in cooperation with the Zamboanga City Water District, established a system that pipes water more than 12kms. to homes and schools in two barangays in

Zamboanga City. The cost of the US\$400,000 project is split between The Rotary Foundation and USAID.

Launched in 2009, the alliance works to implement long-term, sustainable water, sanitation, and hygiene projects in the developing world. The first phase of the partnership has focused on three countries: Ghana, the Philippines, and the Dominican Republic.
