Police awardees were given front page exposure for their exemplary and commendable work which led to the return of substantial amounts of money and the quick rescue of a kidnapping victim.

The November issue was devoted to the Group Study Exchange team which raked in rather good impressions and commendations from their English host families and clubs in Wales.

December was Rotary Family month, hence we showed Gov. James mimicking Santa Claus with the distribution of goodie bags for the kids. Our rotary clubs had their own merrymaking ways and gift-giving activities especially for the children of our less fortunate countrymen.

January saw our clubs undertake Public Image projects to sow Rotary awareness all throughout the district in the effort to encourage new recruits into its folds. Releases on water projects, Project Smiles, among others, show how Rotarians exemplify Service Above Self.

However, there are some achievements that can be reviewed – before the smoke settles!

The major accomplishment has been the creation of a new culture of innovation, which has encouraged both Rotarians and RI staff members to review our policies and procedures at all levels and to determine if they are truly best practices or merely traditional practices. Many changes toward more modern business methods have resulted, and I am encouraged by our progress.

The innovative climate has produced a simplified and streamlined RI Strategic Plan that calls for us to support and strengthen our clubs, focus and increase humanitarian service, and enhance public image and awareness. The first two priorities reaffirm our core values, and the third priority recognizes the need for more public awareness and support in our local communities around the world. The plan has measurable goals, and it provides an excellent road map for Rotary's future growth and development.

Other improvements have included the new regional Rotary coordinators, whose job is to help our district governors to help our clubs to become Bigger, Better, and Bolder. The new Presidential Citation program has provided a score sheet for all of our clubs to test themselves against the other clubs in their districts, and the results will be very helpful to both the current and incoming governors – and to RI as well!

We also have given additional attention to our New Generations programs, particularly Rotaract and Rotary Youth Exchange, and we have focused more emphasis on the Reach Out to Africa initiative. We also have shaped a new approach for the training of incoming district governors and more meaningful assignments for past district governors.

All in all, we have made some significant improvements. But the most important question is whether we have paved the way for an even better year next year. Have we done the right things to ensure that the best days of Rotary are still ahead? And we won't know that – until the smoke settles!

Governor's Valedictory...

A favorite quote of mine comes from Chinese philosopher Lao Tzu, "A journey of a thousand miles begins with a single step". Well my journey as your District Governor started on July 1, last year and has officially ended at midnight of June 30, 2011. And I am very glad that it is OVER. On the other hand, there will be so many wonderful experiences that I will be missing. It was a very memorable year that I wish for other experienced Rotarians to also experience as you will also become District Governors. I admit that there were instances during my project visits

when I was so touched and felt like crying when I see the misery of the people in some of the communities the Rotarians brought me. But at the end of each day, I was over come by the joy of having done service plus the fellowship and fun with Rotarians to cap the day.

1. **Rotary Service Projects** - I can relate to you the many lives that were touched by the very meaningful projects of the Rotarians. The reconstructive surgery of children with cleft lip and palate with operation smile, taghoy and yuhom. The feeding of malnourished children, the donation of wheel chairs to crippled individuals, the water pumps that were provided to waterless communities, the mobile library to improve the reading skills of rural barangays, the construction of livelihood centers where unemployed housewives pool resources to make candles, bags from recycled materials, the donation of slippers and used clothes to children and adults alike. At the end of the day, I cannot help but admire the sincerity of the Rotarians who regularly withdraws from their comfort zones to serve go to rural areas for projects including protecting the environment by planting trees in denuded forest or in mangroves or even organizing youth trainings and seminars.

2. **NEW GENERATIONS.** Our district conducted several projects for the avenue on New Generation. This include the voice of the youth extemporaneous competition held in Club, Zone, District and National Level. This completion allowed us to listen to what our youth have to say about politics, religion, peace, environment, education, and even other issues that affect them. We also conducted ROTARY YOUTH LEADERSHIP AWARDS seminars. The district conducted 3 RYLA seminars during this Rotary Year. One in Zamboanga, One in Bacolod and One in the island of Guimaras. We also had a Rotaract District Conference Here on the last week of May. And a Youth Congress in Bacolod that was hosted by the Rotary Club of Metro Bacolod that addressed the role of the Youth in Environment Protection.

3. **ROTARY EXCHANGE.** We sent three (3) children of Rotarians from our District to Brazil and the United States and another from the neighboring RI District 3860 as a guest ROTEX to US.

a. Nina Tinsay, daughter of PP Bobby And Nining Tinsay of RC Bacolod North was sent to District Brazil

b. RJ Go, son of PP Joe and Tessie Go of RCZC Zamboanga City was sent to RI District 5650, Nebraska, USA

c. Toni, Santa Maria, daughter of PP Vic and Bing Santa Maria of RC Kalibo was sent to Brazil.

d. Kimberly Uymatiao, daughter of PP George Uymatiao of RC Dumaguete South.

This year, we received one ROTEX from the USA, Zach who was hosted by RC of Metro Passi in Iloilo. Also, this year the Rotary Youth Exchange Committee has processed six (6) outbound ROTEX students who will go to US, Belgium and Brazil and Our District will also receive the same number of inbound students the next Rotary Year 2010-11.

4. **GROUP STUDY EXCHANGE.** The District GSE Committee of PP Jundad Legislador sent a team to South Wales, United Kingdom composed of Team Leader PP Raymond Padayhag of RCZC West with Team members, Joanne Marie Pijuan of Iloilo City, Omar John Mejia of Roxas City, Leo Cajulao and Michael Saavedra both of Zamboanga City. This team was considered as one of the best team ever received by RI District 1150 headed by Governor Donna Wallbank.

5. **PUBLIC IMAGE.** I am impressed by the quality and quantity of the public projects of the clubs I visited. Even small clubs undertake public image projects that have very significant impact on the communities they serve. We have made it known to the communities what Rotary and What Rotarians do. Special mention goes to RC Zamboanga City for their STOP TB NOW advocacy and the Public Image Tarpaulin project of RC Bacolod North and the Project Yuhom of RC Iloilo City.

6. **MEMBERSHIP.** On the international setting, membership growth is not very encouraging. A lot of the Districts have been losing members. This has resulted in the merger of Districts which have less than 1,000 members.

Our District has been fortunate to be beyond 1,200 and even breached the 1,300 mark this Rotary Year. We will still be at more than 1,300 as soon as RC Jaro Centraline will be reinstated since they have already settled their 2nd semester dues before the June 30, 2011 deadline.

I have seen the drive of strong clubs in our District to increase their membership. These strong clubs include the Rotary Club of Bacolod North, the Rotary Club of Kalibo, the Rotary Club of Iloilo City, the Rotary Club of Guimaras, the Rotary Club of Roxas, RCZC East and my home club, the Rotary Club of Zamboanga City West.

7. THE ROTARY FOUNDATION CONTRIBUTIONS. Our Foundation with its mission of “Doing Good to the World”. At the start of the Rotary Year, I have set a humble goal of US 50,000 in contributions to TRF. This year, we have found more than 100 rotarians who signed and issued their checks to the foundation. A summary of Rotarians who completed their next level of Paul Harris contribution are, as follows.

The 80 New Paul Harris Fellows is a District Record. I have yet to received the total number of Rotary Foundation Sustaining Members which as of last count numbered more than 20. The most number of RFSM comes from the Rotary Club of Bacolod Marapara.

Let me monetize this contributions per TRF report dated June 30, 2011 with a possible adjustment of about \$ 2,000 representing float items.

In our District’s recent history, our contributions ranked 3rd. PDG Edgar Sy ranks no. 1 of over US100,000 in RY 2009-10 and PDG Toto Locsin ranks 2nd of over US\$90,000 in RY 2006-07.



How do we compare our Distict with other Districts in the Philippines? This year our per capita contribution has ranked us 4th out of the 10 Districts. Only the following Districts have bigger Per Capita Contributions, namely:

1. RID 3800 Marikina, Pasig, Mandaluyong
2. RID 3830 Makati and Palawan
3. RID 3810 Manila, Cavite and Mindoro

In other words, our per capita contributions are bigger than 5th 3820 Bicol Region
6th 3780 Quezon City
7th 3860- Cebu, Leyte, Dumaguete, Bohol, Davao, GenSan.
In fact, our District is better than 5 of the 6 Districts of New Zealand and also better than 7 of the 22 Districts of Australia. On Regional comparison.

9. TSUNAMI REHABILITATION FUND. Climate change has made our weather very unpredictable. We have recorded several calamities that have brought untold tragedies resulting in loss of human lives and properties. Flooding in the US, the Philippines, Australia and India. Tornado in the US, Earthquake in Christchurch, New Zealand, and Tsunami in Japan among others.

These calamities have also brought out the best of human behavior and action as shown by the response of the peoples from different nations, in terms of human aid, equipment mobilization, financial contributions and material and food donations. Our District was one of first to respond. Aside from the DDF Donations of \$8,000 mentioned above, Rotarians and Rotary Clubs contributed more than P200,000, way over the P100 per capita requested by Past RI President Mat Caparas which we have already remitted to the Philippine College of Rotary Governors which excludes the direct club to club donations of Rotary club of Metro Iloilo amounting to \$2,000.

10. The District Conference. We have again witnessed how all the Rotary Clubs of Zamboanga participated, cooperated and supported in the District Conference. A total of 568 Rotarians and spouses registered for the Alegria na Zamboanga. If we add the guests and the support staff, more than 700 were involved in the resounding success of the DISCON. The observation, feedback and compliments given by the visiting Rotarians, Dignitaries, Speakers and Guest will attest to the resounding success. Allow me to again give special recognition for the nth time to Mayor Celso Lobregat, Congressman Erbie Fabian, Congresswoman Beng Climaco, the Discon Team headed by PP Raymond Padayhag, the Rotarian Architects who designed the Pirates night, the Rotarians of RCZC Zamboanga City who were incharge of the speakers and the Governors Ball and my fellow Rotarians of the RC of Zamboanga City West. I could not have done it without you.

11. RI PRESIDENTIAL CITATION-I am happy to inform you that 18 Clubs, including my very own, RCZC West, are recipients of the prestigious and coveted Rotary International Presidential Citation. These clubs have well-rounded and well-thought out programs in all 5 avenues of service namely, Service Projects, Membership, Club Administration, The Rotary Foundation and New Generations.

In closing, I wish to thank each and every single Rotarian and Ann who helped Build Communities and Bridge Continents this Rotary Year. And I thank most of all, the lord Almighty for safeguarding my family while I was away and for blessing me with strength, good health, energy and enthusiasm. Now that my term as District Governor is done, I am back to the folds of my family and my club as an ordinary Rotarian to serve my community. I am also looking forward to enjoy the company of my family with Tess as we see our children Neil, Jason and Michael grow up and who knows, to possibly become Rotarians in the future.
